Kreuger's Death Causes Suicide

BERLIN, Mar. 17 (Sp)—M. Margus, head of the Estonian match monopoly associated with the interests of Ivar Kreuger, hanged himself yesterday because of financial difficulties, a telegram from Weissenstein, Estonia, said today. Margus formerly owned a match factory which was taken over by the Kreuger and Toll concern when the Estonian monopoly was formed. Margus was given a block of stock in Kreuger and Toll and a directorship at a salary of 750 Estonian kroner (normally about \$290) a month. The death of Kreuger was reported to have resulted in an immediate reduction of Margus' salary, while the depreciation of Kreuger and Toll shares severely handicapped him in other financial operations.
