

Rank Outsider Winner of The Grand National

AIRTIME, Mar. 18 (AP)—Once again a rank outsider carried off the honors in the Grand National at the Tropic-Cas Fortin, one of the youngest, homes ever entered in the race, defeated a field of 35 of the best jumpers of the two continents in the 93rd running of the steeplechase classic at Airtime today.

Owned by W. Patterson and quoted at 50 to 1 in the betting, Fortin finished the trying four and one-half miles three lengths in front of Mrs. Ireland's Exponent, another long shot. W. R. McDermott's Shann Gollin, winner in 1929, but a 40 to 1 shot for today's race was far back in third place.

AIRTIME, Mar. 18 (AP)—Fortin, a 50 to 1 shot, owned by W. Patterson, today won the 93rd running of the Grand National steeplechase. Exponent, another outsider, was

second and Shann Gollin, winner in 1929, third. Mrs. Ireland's Exponent, an American owned son of Dan o' War, was eighth.

C. E. Taylor's Gracie, co-favorite with the American owned Heartbreak Hill at 5 to 1, failed to finish the first round of the four and one-half mile journey. Thirty-six ran. Gracie, owned by E. E. Nelson, failed to finish, as did John Ray Whittey's Ducky Fox, of the American contingent of 35 horses.

Fortin, owned by W. Patterson, won by three lengths. Exponent, carrying the silks of Mrs. Ireland, easily defeated Shann Gollin.

Among the finishers were Mrs. C. E. Bird's Heartbreak Hill, Sir P. O. Lawrence's Aspinant and Lord Glenagarry's Antares, which ran third back of Gracie last year.

Only nine finished the course. Heartbreak Hill was the first American owned jumper to cross the line, finishing sixth.

CAGE TOURNEY IN IDAHO IN SEMI-FINALS

TWIN FALLS, Mar. 18 (AP)—Four powerful high school basketball teams battle today and tonight for the right to enter the finals of the Idaho state interscholastic tournament with the Idaho Falls five, 1931 winner, looming as the favorite.

The tournament opened yesterday afternoon with victories by Idaho Falls and Coeur d'Alene, last year's runner-up, and the first round concluded last night with the Twin Falls five and the Oakley quintet registering victories.

Idaho Falls easily defeated Boise, southernmost district champion, 36 to 20. Coeur d'Alene displayed power by eliminating Pocatello, 42 to 28. Twin Falls overpowered the Little Challis team, 38 to 25, and Oakley came from far behind in the second half to overwhelm Lewiston, 28 to 20.

In the championship night semi-final today, Idaho Falls met Coeur d'Alene and Twin Falls clashes with Oakley.

Boys' clashes with Pocatello and Challis takes on Lewiston in the consolation round.

The finals will be played tomorrow night.

Mangin, Shields, Bell And Lott In Semi-Finals

NEW YORK, Mar. 18 (AP)—George Lott of Chicago alone remained to dispute the eastern monopoly on semi-final berths in the national indoor tennis championships today.

The No. 2 ranking player, despite his inexperience, 24, 2nd, boards, sailed into the rounds before the final contest along with Gregory B. Mangin of Newark, and Frank Shields and Berkeley Bell of New York.

Pairings today set Lott against Mangin and Bell against Shields. Bell was idle yesterday. His straight set victory over Jean Borotra, the defending champion, on Wednesday had placed him in the semi-finals a day ahead of the others.

Mangin eliminated Sidney E. Wood of New York in easy fashion, 6-4, 6-2, 6-3. Shields, ranked No. 3 nationally, defeated Frank Bowden of New York, 6-1, 7-5, and Lott disposed of Huxley Julius Seigrist of New York, 4-7, 6-4.

In doubles, Bell and Mangin defeated William Appleton and Pierre Rodolphe, 11-9, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3, to enter the final round. Their opponents on Saturday will be the winners of today's semi-final match between Lott and John Van Ryn of Philadelphia, and Shields and Eugene McCallister of New York.

Wallace Attempts Comeback Tonight

NEW YORK, Mar. 18 (AP)—Thirty-one-year-old Billy Wallace of Cleveland, once a leading lightweight contender, comes back to Madison Square Garden tonight to face Sammy Fulmer, south Boston youngster, in a ten round bout.

Wallace's comeback has been marked by two quiet knockout victories, the last over Eddie (Kid) Wolfe of Memphis.

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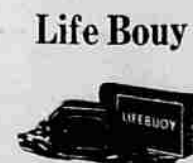
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
