Heavy Increase In Butter Being Moved Out Today

PORTLAND, Mar. 18 (AP)—Very heavy increase in production of butter in Portland and in the northwest territory is being moved out rapidly and at recent betterment in the price list.

The increase during the last week or so has been remarkable and instead of creating weakness as during normal periods, has found a call at higher figures, at least for everything except the extreme top grade.

San Francisco has been the chief market for Oregon butter recently. Market for eggs is showing further weakness with cash buyers offering a reduction of 1c for the day, owing to the added competition of direct selling to retailers by the country.

Market is a trifle easier all around for light weight hens as a result of the increasing supply from the north. The buying price has been reduced to 10c for light, 15c for medium and 15c for heavy sorts.

General conditions in the cheese trade appear fully steady through the country, with an increasing consumptive call and decreasing storage stocks at leading points.

First of the season's outdoor grown rhubarb to be received by a wholesaler was reported in from Clackamas. The initial shipment consisted of 11 lugs which sold 7c lb.

Conditions in the local broomstick market are about steady, advises the Pacific Fruit company, which is specializing on the Roseburg product. Sales of No. 1 standard crates are being made \$1.15 to \$1.25. Smaller crates reported selling 10c to 15c less.

Only one carload lot of onions was reported bought at 8c at primary points during the last 24 hours. Most growers are seeking within a fraction of 47c with operators not offering above 46c.

Added snap is reflected in the market for potatoes at nearby primary points. Purchases of Burbanks for seed and for table stock are in larger volume with the latter mostly 50c to 60c central, with bags furnished.

Notes of wholesale trading: Veal market is "shot" badly, with accumulating supplies.

Country killed hog market continued firm; mainly 7 to 7 1/2 c.

Dressed spring lambs are quoted 17 to 20c lb. with nothing but good stuff wanted. Others drag.

There is a shortage of turkeys again, with the market assuming a fair degree of strength.

Some ordinary quality hothouse tomatoes are moving \$2.50 a crate. Few arriving. Mexicans firm.

MARKET HEAVY AT CLOSE
NEW YORK, Mar. 18 (AP)—A sinking spell in the utilities carried the stock market off rather sharply today, and while the list tried to recover in the afternoon, it failed to make much headway. The market closed with a heavy tone, and numerous net losses of 1 to more than 3 points.

The fresh relapse in share prices was accompanied by a good deal of rather gloomy gossip attributed in some quarters to bear sources. This sort of gossip switched today from the rails to the utilities.

Cause of Weather Changes

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Mar. 18 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "The domestic wool market is dull and weaker, with the manufacturers endeavoring to buy the best fine staple domestic wools on a clean basis of 50 cents, and other grades proportionately low."

"The manufacturing outlook is not very cheering at the moment, and consumption has been decreasing lately. For what little business is available competition is exceedingly keen among the manufacturers."

"London closed firm and at the top for the series, most of the losses at the opening having been recovered but the Australian market showed an easier tendency at the end of the week."

"In the west, buyers and growers are mostly deadlocked over the price for the new clip, growers being reluctant to accept lower prices than a year ago, although dealers dare not pay more than the manufacturing situation warrants."

"Reports from Texas that the National Wool Marketing corporation has sold 5,000,000 pounds of adult mohair to a carpet mill at 7 cents a pound are not true, although some negotiations to this end appear to have been undertaken."
