SALEM, Mar. 19 (AP)—Frenzied basketball featured the elimination in both the championship and consolation series yesterday, and fans setting a record in attendance witnessed heart-breaking victories and defeats. The Astoria-Benson high school game will not be forgotten with the lead of one point margin away back and forth in the final minutes of play.

Astoria and Salem high schools will meet tonight for the state championship, and from the performances of these two in the past, it should be a fast breaking contest. Astoria took the Benson game upsetting what little hope there was, by a score of 26 to 25, while Salem defeated the Corvallis aggregation, which played a percentage style of game, by a 35 to 23 score.

Benson Meets Corvallis
The eight teams to finish in the list were selected as a result of yesterday's games. Benson high school will meet Corvallis in a game which will place the winners in third position and the losers in sixth place. The dope favors Benson to take the game.

University high and Marshall open today's contest, the winner to place fifth and the loser eighth. Following them Medford will meet Nehalem for fourth and seventh places. These two contests likewise are hard to predict.

Two one-point victories on successive days won Astoria the right to compete against Salem for the state championship. The third time in 12 trips to the state tournament that they have achieved that honor. Astoria has participated in every state tournament but one, and played in the finals in 1923 and 1930. It won the 1930 championship, defeating Salem 32 to 17.

Salem on the other hand will be playing in the final game for the eighth time and has three state championship trophies tucked away. It is Salem's third successive time in the finals.

John L. Gary, secretary of the state high school athletic association today said the board appreciated the large crowds at the tournament games which this year bid fair to break all previous records. The Willamette gymnasium was packed to the limit last night, and officials have a waiting list of hundreds seeking tickets for the game tonight—and all room sold out.

Gary further said the board had no protest before it against Palmbrook, star Astoria forward, and no action would be taken upon complaint of individuals. He referred to the verbal complaint made by Emerson Sims, Portland attorney, who declared Palmbrook over the eligible age. All protests must be made through school officials, he announced, adding he did not expect any protest against tournament players here now.

Medford Defeats Lincoln
In the afternoon games yesterday Medford was forced to stage a big rally to order to overcome Lincoln high school of Portland while Nehalem had no task to take Hood River down the avenue leading out of the tournament. Medford was forced to put up the same kind of a fight which almost won them the game against Astoria the day before, a point margin separating them.

The old "Medford comeback" was all that saved the Peppercorns from dropping out of the tournament. After trailing far behind an inspired Lincoln quieted through the second and third periods, Medford hit its stride and won, 27 to 22.

"Duke" Wellington, elongated Lincoln center, was the main cog in Dave Wright's machine, throwing the early part of the game and when W. White of Medford finally checked the Duke, Patch, Lebonson and

Kobin came through to keep the Ralpletters ahead.
But Scheel, red-headed Medford guard, finally found the range as he had done in the Astoria game, and Lindley after shifting from center to guard helped out along with T. White, and Medford forged into the lead in the last five minutes and kept piling it up with a delayed offense that pulled Lincoln out of position.

Nichols Winner Of N. B. A. Belt As Light Heavy

CHICAGO, Mar. 19 (AP)—George Nichols, swarthy, 23-year-old Italian from Buffalo, scaling just three pounds over the middleweight limit, and giving away 10½ pounds to his opponent, today had become the national boxing association's defender of the world light heavyweight championship.

A close decision victory over Dave Maier of Milwaukee, after ten rounds of savage southpaw slugfests at the Chicago stadium last night, put the 163-pound Nichols at the top of the 175-pound division, won him a diamond studded belt, and closed the national boxing association's elimination tournament.

As far as the N. B. A. is concerned, Nichols has earned the title formerly owned by Maxie Rosenbloom of New York. Rosenbloom, after winning the title in a New York elimination, was so badly beaten about defending it that the N. B. A. declared a throne room vacant and ordered an elimination contest of its own.

Both left-handers, Nichols the long-shot, and Maier, the favorite, fought like cave-men every second of the way. There was almost no clinch. Nichols almost always landed the inspired courage carried him to triumph. Many times when he seemed to be slowing down, he rallied to turn the tide in his own favor, and the crowd of nearly 10,000 roared approval when Nichols, blood trickling down his face from a cut on top of his head, stood while General John V. Clinch, president of the N. B. A., fastened the championship belt about his waist.

The battle was so close that John Houghton, one of the judges, disagreed with Referee Phil Collins and the other judge, Ed Kline, who voted for Nichols.

Cambridge Crew Defeats Oxford Before 750,000

PUTNEY-ON-THAMES, Eng., Mar. 19 (AP)—Cambridge's canoe swept to decisive victory over Oxford in the 84th race of their century-old rowing rivalry here today.

Three quarters of a million persons, lining either bank of the Thames, saw Cambridge snatch the lead in the first mile and a half of the four-mile race, and steadily widen that advantage to cross the finish line five lengths ahead of the struggling Oxford shell.

It was the light blue's ninth straight victory over Oxford, their 12th in the last 19 contests and their 4th in the ancient classic first rowed in 1829. Oxford has won 40 races and one—that of 1877—resulted in a dead heat.

The victors seemed to be out for a paddle as they crossed the finish line while Oxford's sweep-oarsmen collapsed over their oars.

Cambridge covered the shortened course of nine miles in 11 minutes 11 seconds, comparatively slow time for the Oxford crew of 1911 set up a mark of 18 minutes 29 seconds for the full course of four miles and a quarter.

Cambridge's mark of nine straight victories equaled the series record set by Oxford through the races of 1861-69 and 1890-1898.

BURRELL TOPS CAGE SCORERS AT SALEM, ORE.

SALEM, Mar. 19 (AP)—Salem's star center, Burrell, forced out in the lead in scoring honors yesterday with a total of 42 points. He added 12 to his previous total of 30 during the third day of the state basketball tournament here. However he is followed closely with 41 points by Adams, Nehalem guard, who jumped from fifth place to second by adding 15 yesterday.

Neal McLean, Marshall's fat forward, who was in the position after the second day with Burrell, placed third with 38 points. He still holds honors for scoring the highest points in one game, with 21 to his credit. Sanford, Salem guard in fourth with 35, and Bergstrom, Astoria forward, fifth with 30.

Major league baseball's "farm or chain store" system has come to stay and play a very vital part, more rapidly than was anticipated, in the game's development, in the belief of William Harbridge, president of the American League.

"The objections to this type of minor league ownership, on a graded basis, rapidly have disappeared," said Harbridge, in discussing the situation while in Florida.

Present day conditions in the minors, of course, have prompted the major league club owners to ex-

tend their holdings on a systematic basis, in addition to the obvious advantages gained by the pioneers in this business.

"Most of the American league clubs that can afford it are going in for more minor league ownership, in addition to continuing or extending working agreements."

Areas Closed To Hunting And Fishing

At a meeting of the Oregon state game commission, held for the purpose of determining during what part of any particular year or years, the supply of particular species of game fish, game birds, non-game birds or game and fur-bearing animals will be injuriously affected by hunting and fishing, the notice of which meeting was published, as by law provided, the Oregon state game commission did find that in the portions of the state of Oregon and in the bodies of water thereof, hereinafter named, during the period of times hereinafter named the supply of game fish and game, non-game and fur-bearing animals will be injuriously affected by the taking thereof in the portions of the state of Oregon, and during the time hereinafter mentioned; and the Oregon state game commission does hereby make its findings pursuant to said hearing. Now, therefore:

It is hereby ordered that the season for taking any of the game fish of the state of Oregon, and for the taking of any of the game animals, non-game animals or fur-bearing animals of the state of Oregon, shall be, and it is hereby, closed in the portions of the state of Oregon and in the bodies of water thereof, and during the time hereinafter named; and hunting, pursuing, killing, taking, trapping, angling for or having in possession any of the species thereof shall be unlawful in any such portion or portions of the state, during such closed seasons, and the taking of a bag limit larger than hereinafter indicated shall be unlawful. April 15, 1932, to and including May 15, 1932, said bag limit is mentioned herein the bag limit provided by statute shall apply.

Baker County
All lakes and their tributaries situated in Baker county shall be closed to angling to and including June 14, 1932, and such lakes and tributaries shall be closed from the beginning of the period of years ending May 30, 1932, to and including June 14, 1932, inclusive, during that period of years ending May 30, 1932. The Willamette river, for a distance of 200 feet above and 200 feet below the fishway on the west bank of said river near the Crown-Willamette Paper company's pulp mill at Oregon City, closed to angling to and including June 14, 1932.

That part of the Willamette river known as the fall race of the Crown-Willamette Paper Company, described as follows: Beginning at a point near the mouth of said river, on the south bank thereof, thence extending across said fall race following the line established by the bridge crossing said river, thence to the bank thereof; thence in a westerly, southerly and easterly direction around the bank of said fall race to the place of beginning, closed to angling to and including June 14, 1932.

Trout creek, a tributary of the Molalla river, closed to angling until June 14, 1932.

Clatsop County
That part of the Klaskanine river beginning at Barth Falls, approximately three miles above the state fish commission hatchery, and extending to the mouth of the river, thence following the south fork of said river, closed to and including May 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending May 14, 1932, said river shall be closed to angling from December 1 to May 14 of the following year, both dates inclusive.

Cook County
Fairy creek above the lower boundary of the hatchery property of the state game commission and all tributaries thereof, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932.

Deschutes County
That part of Paulina lake below a line across said lake beginning at a point which is known as the boat landing at the Paulina Lake resort and thence following a line across said lake to the point where the line thereof; and also that part of the outlet of said lake from said outlet to the falls, closed to angling for a period of years ending April 14, 1932.

That part of East lake west of a line beginning at a point on the north shore of said lake, 20 chains south of the point where the line of sections 19 and 20, township 21 north, range 13 east, Willamette meridian; thence running south 23 degrees west across said lake to a point on the north shore of said lake, 20 chains north of the quarter section corner between sections 30 and 31, township 21 north, range 13 east, Willamette meridian; thence running south 23 degrees west across said lake to a point on the north shore of said lake, 20 chains north of the quarter section corner between sections 31 and 32, township 18 south, range 8 east, Willamette meridian; thence due east 1500 feet to the east shore of said lake, closed to angling for a period of years ending April 14, 1932.

East lake, Paulina lake, Elk lake, Paulina creek, Little Paulina lake and Spark lake and tributaries of each of said lakes closed to angling to and including May 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending May 14, 1932, said lakes and tributaries thereof shall be closed to angling from the 21st day of September to the 14th day of May of the following year, both dates inclusive. Provided, however, that the bag limit on East lake, Paulina lake and Elk lake shall be ten pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 20 fish in any one day, and 30 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 50 fish in any seven consecutive days.

That part of the Deschutes river known as Crane Prairie, beginning at the impounding dam on said river to a point 200 feet below said impounding dam and all tributaries, except Snow creek, to and including April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932, said river and tributaries thereof shall be closed to angling from the mouth of Snow creek to Lava lake, closed for a period of years ending April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932.

That part of the Deschutes river from the mouth of Snow creek to Lava lake, and Snow creek shall be closed to angling until May 30, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending May 30, 1932, said portion of said Deschutes river and said Snow creek shall be closed to angling from December 1 to May 30 of the following year, both dates inclusive. Provided, that the bag limit shall be ten pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 20 fish in any one day, and 30 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 50 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Bobby lake closed to angling to and including May 30, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending May 30, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending May 30, 1932, said lake shall be closed to angling from September 16 to May 30 of the following year, both dates inclusive.

Elk County
That part of the Deschutes river from the mouth of Snow creek to Lava lake, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932, said river and tributaries thereof shall be closed to angling from the mouth of Snow creek to Lava lake, closed for a period of years ending April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932.

Jefferson County
That part of the Metolius river above the mouth of Lake Creek and below the mouth of the Deschutes river, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932, said river and tributaries thereof shall be closed to angling from the 21st day of September to the 14th day of May of the following year, both dates inclusive. Provided, that the bag limit on said lakes shall be 15 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 25 fish in any one day, and 30 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 50 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Link creek in Jefferson county, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932.

Josephine County
The Rogue river from the Savage Rapids dam to a point 400 feet below said dam, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932.

Klamath County
Spencer creek closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932, said creek shall be closed to angling from the mouth of the creek to a point 300 feet below said dam, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932.

Klamath River
Klamath river for a distance of 4000 feet below and 2000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek closed to angling to and including June 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending June 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending June 14, 1932, said river shall be closed to angling from the 1st day of September to the 30th day of May of the following year, both dates inclusive, for and during that period of years ending June 14, 1932.

Linn County
Hackleman Creek, a tributary of Fish lake, closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932.

That part of Marion Lake lying west of a line drawn south across said lake from a point known as outlet rock on the north shore of said lake, closed to angling to and including the 14th day of April, 1932.

That part of Marion Lake lying east of a line drawn south across said lake from a point known as outlet rock on the north shore of said lake closed to angling from October 1 to April 14 of the following year, both dates inclusive, for and during that period of years ending September 14, 1932. Provided, that the bag limit on that part of Marion lake open to angling shall be 15 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 25 fish in any one day, and 30 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 50 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Marion Creek from Marion lake to what is known as Marion and Linn Falls in said stream closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932.

That part of Clear Lake south of a line drawn east and west across

to May 30 of the following year, both dates inclusive.

That part of Odell creek from Odell lake to a point one-half mile downstream closed to angling for a period of years ending April 14, 1932; that part of Odell creek other than hereinabove described, closed to angling to and including May 15, 1932, and thereafter closed from September 16 to May 30 of the following year, both dates inclusive, for and during that period of years ending May 30, 1932. Provided, that the bag limit on said portion of said lake shall be 15 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 25 fish in any one day, and 30 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 50 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Seven-Mile creek and Wood river, closed to angling to and including June 14, 1932, and thereafter during the period of years ending June 14, 1932, said lakes and tributaries thereof shall be closed to angling between September 16 and May 30 of the following year, both dates inclusive.

Fish Lake and Lake of the Woods, closed to angling to and including May 30, 1932, and thereafter during the period of years ending May 30, 1932, said lakes shall be closed to angling for trout from December 1 to April 14 of the following year, both dates inclusive. Provided, that the bag limit for trout on said lakes shall be ten pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 20 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 30 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Except as in the preceding paragraph provided, the bag limit for trout on said lakes shall be ten pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 20 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 30 fish in any seven consecutive days.

Lake County
Dox lake closed to angling to and including April 14, 1932, and thereafter during each year of the period of years ending April 14, 1932.

Blue Lake, Campbell Lake and Dead Horse Lake
Blue Lake, Campbell Lake and Dead Horse Lake closed to angling to and including July 14, 1932, and thereafter during the period of years ending July 14, 1932, said lakes shall be closed to angling from September 1 to July 14 of the following year, both dates inclusive.

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
