

Gain In Supply Of Butter Finds Demand Up Also

PORTLAND, Mar. 19 (P)—Continued heavy increase in the supply of butter here is being quickly taken care of by the liberal gain in the demand.

Butterfat market continues firm locally, with station prices still mixed as a result of the warfare forced by an outside organization.

General trading in the egg market continues more or less uneasy on account of the under-selling by organized producers.

While there was no further change in the price of live chickens for the weekend, general trade conditions continue a trifle slow.

Quality turkeys are finding a rather steady demand along the wholesale way, even though some shaded values continue for undergrades of both hens and toms.

Good trade conditions are generally continued in the market for country-killed meats with the possible exception of veal.

Sharp advance of 50c crate is reported in the price of head lettuce here as a result of higher primary markets in California and Arizona.

Fairly steady price and conditions are reflected for broccoli, with Roseburg stock in very liberal offering.

DRIED PRUNE INDUSTRY IN BAD CONDITION

CORVALLIS, Ore., Mar. 9 (P)—The dried prune industry of the Pacific Northwest is facing a serious problem in marketing its remaining stocks advantageously.

The serious disruption of foreign trade is probably the chief difficulty, the report said.

Mid-March prices on all grades of Italian prunes at Northwest markets were down from 1 to 2 cents a pound compared with the Dec. 1 price.

The greatest activity in the Oregon prune market has been in Douglas county where a limited volume of date prunes were sold at prices slightly below Italian and Pettis.

The Northwest price ranges to growers on Italian prunes at the mid-month were: 35-40c, 2½@2¾c; 40-45c, 2@2¼c; 45-50c, 1½@1¾c.
