## SHARKSKIN-LIKE FABRIC TRIMS SPRING FROCKS

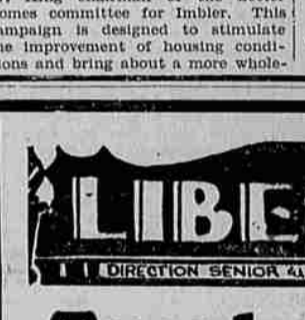
