

Extras Up One Cent Today In Butter Market

PORTLAND, Mar. 22 (AP)—Advance of 1c in the price of extras in the butter trade on the produce exchange for the late season, appears the result of general betterment in the situation along the Pacific slope. The keen demand for outside supplies by San Francisco continues the dominating feature of the trade and appears a trifle out of line with the normal.

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STOCK MARKET RECOVERS NEW YORK, Mar. 22 (AP)—The stock market recovered in the last hour of trading today after a substantial slump earlier largely in sympathy with wheat. Losses were generally erased, although American Telephone was off 2 at the finish.

The closing tone was steady. Transfers were about 1,000,000 shares. An easier tone in the money market was a favorable development.

U. S. Steel recovered after selling off 1 1/2. Union Pacific was well supported on its favorable February statement, and closed unchanged.

Eggs Go Down Three Cents In Local Markets

Eggs have dropped down three cents and are selling at 15c a dozen for fresh extras now. Mediums, which were selling at 15c, are now quoted at 10c; while the mixed are 10c a dozen, showing a 2 1/2c drop.

Fresh halibut and salmon are now on the market at very low local market prices, and the price quoted on salmon is 80c a pound, while halibut has dropped from 80c to 25c a pound.

Wheat Surplus Likely July 1 9,520,504 Bu.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 22 — Today's indicated wheat surplus in the Pacific northwest on July 1 is set at 9,520,504 bushels in a survey of wheat stocks made public by Henry W. Collins, western vice president of Farmers National Grain corporation.

On January 1, the indicated surplus at the end of the crop year was 10,754,121 bushels. The decline of more than 1,250,000 bushels in indicated surplus is as predicted at the first of the year by Mr. Collins.

Increased demand from California as a result of resumption of the old grain freight rates cutting down wheat movement to California from the intermountain and southwest wheat belts is expected to be a large factor in reducing Pacific northwest wheat stocks.

The current survey released by Mr. Collins is made as of March 1. On that date, shipments of wheat and flour to California and foreign ports had totaled 43,902,515 bushels.

Wheat on hand at terminals and in the country March 1 is set at 14,487,485 bushels. Of the total 4,969,981 bushels had been sold but not shipped, or was regarded as of sure demand. There remained 9,507,504 bushels to be shipped on the China sale, 416,000 bushels sold but not shipped to California and 2,500,000 bushels estimated assured California requirements.

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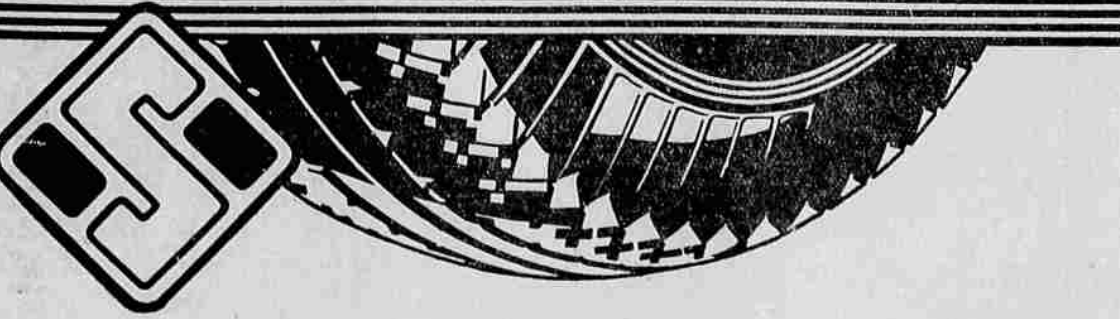
