Tips on CONTRACT A BLUFF DISCARD By Tom O'Neil When success with a contract is difficult it pays at times to give the opposition a chance to make mistakes. There are real squeeze plays in which the defending side is helpless against the playing of successive trumps or high cards of another suit.

There are also pseudo squeezes in which the enemy guesses wrong as to what to discard. A recent accomplishment of Bill Huske, one of Ely Culbertson's right hand men, is the making of a little slam at no trump by discarding the

eight of spades and then taking the last trick with the six spot after an opponent had discarded the queen. Here was the hand: The bidding: west one spade; north pass; east three hearts; south pass; west four no trump; north pass; east six no trump, the contract. The winning card is shown in squares. The next lead is immediately underneath. North had to find two discards and shed spades in the belief that west was holding the ten of clubs for a squeeze. West's discard of the eight of spades on the tenth trick contributed to that belief, as did his play of the ace on trick seven. If he had read the south's play of clubs correctly north could have shed his clubs and held spades, setting Huske one.

INDIANA NET STARS DOMINATE BIG TEN

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP)—Accumulating high scoring honors in Big Ten basketball is becoming an Indiana custom. When Johnny Wooden, of Purdue, set an all-time record this year with 154 points in a season he became the eighth Hoosier court man to hold a season's high scoring record in 12 years. Six times a Purdue player, two times an Indiana university player in the 12 years have annexed the honor. Purdue's high scorers were Don White in 1921, Blair Gullion in 1922, George Spradling in 1924, Wilbur Cummins in 1927, "Stretch" Murphy in 1929, and Wooden, Indiana's high men were Art Beckner in 1929 and Branch McCracken in 1930.

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LINDBERGH BABY CASE CLUES ARE HELD VALUELESS

(Continued From Page One) He was accused in 1915 of investigating the slaying of Latsy Boyla, rival gangster, and was sent up for 20 years for manslaughter. Paroled eight years later, he was recently accused of breaking his parole after investigation of laundry racketeers unearthed testimony he erred in calling himself a laundry operative.

Three others working independently of authorities, also have failed to get the baby back thus far. They are Saly Spitalo and Irving Bitz, authorized by the Lindberghs to deal with the kidnapers, and Morris Roemer, who announced the baby was safe and would be returned. The announcement was made more than ten days ago. The police continue to press the hunt. In New York they seek Harry Fleischer, former member of Detroit's Purple Gang. Detectives ready to shoot raided a Bronx flat yesterday. In the place were two women and Walter Cohn, who said he had a friend who knew Fleischer. None of the three was arrested. Then New York police turned their attention to a "tip" the baby was with a family in Queens. That pettered out.

H. Wallace Caldwell, former president of the Chicago Board of Education, called at the Lindbergh home with information he believed of value, but Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, head of the state police, said it was of "no importance." Caldwell said the "situation is extremely critical" but refused to elaborate. Nothing came to light to substantiate reports the kidnapers had got in touch with him and gave him instructions to relay to the Lindberghs. "Leads" still poured in — one from as far away as Bogota, Colombia. The newspaper El Pais received a report from Manizales that a "reliable authority" there knows the baby is held on an island near Buenaventura, Colombia.

ANXIOUS TO ASSIST BOGOTA, Colombia, Mar. 23 (AP)—Major Benjamin Mendez, one of the best fliers in Colombia and a friend of Col. Lindbergh, received permission from the war office today to fly to Buenaventura where it was reported the kidnaped Lindbergh baby was held on an island near the coast. The flight will not be made, however, unless the American legation requests it. Major Mendez, the father of a two weeks old son, said he hoped he would be able to help Col. Lindbergh and he would do anything to assist in the child's recovery. A direct flight between the two cities never has been made and at some points the trip is extremely dangerous, for the plane must be lured to 30,000 feet over three ranges of the Andes.
