

The Garden

ANNUALS GIVE THE MOST BLOOM
Various cuts and fads prevail in the gardening world from time to time which in due course of events resolve themselves into their proper perspective. One of these some twenty years ago was the campaign to banish annuals as the chief supply of garden decoration in favor of the more permanent material furnished by the hardy perennials. There was much point in the advocacy of the free use of perennials as the backbone of the garden but in abolishing the annuals in favor of perennials it was speedily discovered that it was impossible to maintain a continuous display of color supply of bloom without an equal supply of annuals.

They are the freest blooming of all garden material, the most quickly brought into bloom and most reliable for solid masses of color. Perennials for the most part have brief seasons of bloom, not more than a month. Then their space offers nothing in the way of color. They must be supplemented by annuals in liberal quantity.

An entire garden of annuals will furnish much more bloom during the season than an entire garden of perennials, for the reason that there are so many more annuals of long blooming season than there are perennials. One need mention only marigolds, zinnias, and petunias which may be depended upon from July to killing frosts.

Annuals also are the mainstays for cutting. They should be grown in quantity not only for garden decoration but in reserve beds or rows for cutting. A mass of annuals designed for garden decoration cannot be lavishly cut without weakening the garden display. In the reserve supply no such consideration enters. They are there to be cut and for no other purpose.

In the main garden, cutting should be reduced to removing fading flowers and preventing the formation of seed to keep up the supply of bloom. When an annual is allowed to go to seed its bloom lags. Its mission in life is to produce seed in one year after which it dies.

Annuals must be the main dependence for continuous bloom in the garden. The interest in annuals has been renewed as the knowledge of sound gardening becomes more widespread. They have once more taken the position of importance they deserve and every gardener now knows

he cannot get along and have a bright garden all summer without them. Order liberal supplies of annual seed.

VIRUS DISEASES

It is not entirely by accident that one of the first germs to be discovered and studied was anthrax bacillus.

This germ is one of the largest among the disease-producing microorganisms, and its size made it easily visible.

This in turn prompts us to reflect on how much medicine owes to the other sciences, particularly to physics and chemistry. Without the microscope the world of the infinitely small would have remained closed to man; if not forever, certainly for many generations.

In the early years of bacteriology there was a feverish race among scientists for the privilege of being the first to discover the germs of various diseases.

In the last quarter of the nineteenth century there were discovered—by name but a few of the most important ones—the germs of leprosy, gonorrhea, typhoid fever, pneumonia, erysipelas, diphtheria, cholera, tetanus, bubonic plague and tuberculosis.

The field of disease germs was quickly combed, and the pickings, so to say, became more difficult.

Visibility had much to do with this mounting difficulty. To overcome this new method for staining germs were devised and the enlarging power of the microscope was increased.

By a process of elimination the larger and more readily identifiable disease-causing agents were discovered. And what remain are the infinitely small and practically invisible, living, disease-producing agents.

This division includes the virus diseases, to which a vast amount of study is at present being devoted. As in former times, the microscope is being subjected to constant improvement.

One fertile promise lies in the application of ultra-violet light, and photography to the study of virus agents. Through this combination objects not perceptible to the human eye may be studied indirectly.

MRS. FORTESCUE CALM AS TRIAL NEARS; 'NOT GUILTY' HER ONLY REPLY TO CHARGE

HONOLULU (AP)—Visibly little affected by nervous strain, Mrs. Grace Fortescue, society leader formerly of New York and Washington, awaits calmly the lifting of the court curtain on the next act of the drama that shook the foundations of Hawaii's social structure.

A flat plea of "not guilty" has been the sole reply of the stately, gray-haired niece of Alexander Graham Bell, and of her three co-defendants, to the accusations that they put Joseph Kahahawai, a native Hawaiian, to death as retribution for the mistreatment of Mrs. Fortescue's daughter, Thalia Massie.

Mrs. Massie is the wife of Naval Lieut. Thomas H. Massie, one of the four defendants soon to answer section and degree murder charges in connection with the slaying.

As the time nears when "all is to be told," there is no hint of foreboding in Mrs. Fortescue's appearance. With the graciousness born of the drawing room she receives visitors, plays bridge or chats with her daughter, and is outwardly composed.



As the time approaches for her to go on trial in Honolulu for the slaying of Joseph Kahahawai, Mrs. Grace Fortescue remains outwardly composed. She occupies her time playing bridge and reading sympathetic letters from friends. Mrs. Fortescue's son-in-law, Lieut. Thomas H. Massie, and two navy men, E. J. Lord and Albert O. Jones, face trial with her.

Treasurer: Mrs. Florence Bacon, incumbent, and J. E. Reynolds, both of La Grande, Republicans. County clerk: C. K. McCormick, Republican incumbent, and Sidney Thompson, Democrat, both of La Grande.

County commissioner: W. W. Stevens, incumbent, and Merton Davis, both Republicans of Union.

County coroner: F. L. Ralston, Republican incumbent, La Grande. County assessor: David L. Proctor, incumbent, of La Grande, and H. H. Hug, of Egin, both Republicans.

He told of fields littered with debris, houses torn to splinters and forests that were a mass of broken tree trunks and branches.

Field Representative Crane of Red Cross gave a picture of conditions in a ten-mile long, 400-yard-wide strip of country in Madison county in North Georgia. He found 56 homes demolished, 9 partially destroyed, 14 persons dead and 170 injured in that territory, he said. The countryside, he added was co-operating in helping the sufferers.
