

Undergrade Egg Situation Cause Of Lower Prices

PORTLAND, Mar. 24 (AP)—Sale of undergrade eggs in Portland as fresh stock is proving a very serious factor in maintaining already low record prices. These so-called undergrade eggs, being sold as extras, to consumers, are being purchased below the established prices for top grade.

More rigid enforcement of the state law regarding grading is being demanded by local producers who claim that some outsiders are evading the Oregon statutes and bringing disaster to the industry and price.

The selling of so-called undergrade eggs as well as the peddling by pro-

ducers direct to retailers, is responsible for much of the local disaster, according to E. J. Dixon, general manager of the local co-ops.

There was no change in the general butter market trade for the day on the open market for either cubes or prints. Practically all offerings are being absorbed at full prices.

Northern interests continue to hurt sales of chickens in the local trade as a result of forcing considerable light and medium weight hens on the market here. Springs and heavy hens are in good call.

Demand for dressed hen turkeys continue to exceed current supply here but prices appears about as high as buyers care to follow. Toms are scarce but quality in general is nothing to brag about.

First Texas potatoes of the season were due to arrive in Portland late in the day. They are of the Triumph

variety and will be priced 8c lb. packed in 50s.

Market for broccoli-cauliflower remains firm at practically all points. At Roseburg \$1 is still being offered and paid for in and in California a similar trend is reflected.

Artichokes have reached an unusually low price in Portland with very liberal offerings. Best stuff is now being quoted down to 50¢ per doz. for 72 and smaller.

Slower onion trade is reflected both at the source and at distributive points. Country holders are still asking full prices but buyers are taking no action whatever. Sales to retailers here average less than a dozen sacks a day for the entire trade.

Notes of wholesale trading:

Country killed spring lambs in very strong demand. Old crop lambs and mutton too.

Demand for dressed hogs remains firm and active. Veal still slow.

Asparagus market is considered steady; most sales 13¢ to 14¢ lb.

Spinach is weaker and generally shows a lower price.

Mushroom sales are limited for hot-house stock. Price held.

Potatoes are less active in the country with local trade fair.

Firmer tone was shown for Roseburg broccoli on the east side farmers' wholesale market. There was little No. 1 stock in sight in view of the law demanding right of grading but 2s were listed mostly 75¢. Local stock was 60¢ to 75¢ crate with little above 70¢.

Spinach market was congested with prices weak around 65¢ orange box generally; a few higher.

Carrots were very firm with most sales of 75¢.

Dry onions were firm at \$7.50 for 1s and \$5 for 2s and boilers.

Green onions were easier at 25¢ to 30¢ doz bunches.

Onions in small supply and good call; mostly 75¢ to 80¢ box.

SALES TAX REJECTED IN HOUSE TODAY

The house voted to exempt parts of farm machinery but rejected the hardware exemption 81 to 62.

The house disapproved 91 to 37 an amendment by Laguardia (R. N. Y.), to exempt all materials used in the manufacture of articles specifically exempted of the tax including food and clothing.

Representative Blanton (D. Tex.) then offered and saw approved an amendment to exempt ice.

An amendment to exempt all mail from the sales tax proposed by Representative Schafer (R. Wis.) was defeated as was one by Representative Celler (D. N. Y.), to exempt kitchen utensils and household articles used in the preparation of food.

Flag is Exempted

An amendment proposed by Representative Millard (R. N. Y.), to insert the flag of the United States as an exempted article along with Bibles was adopted.

Representative Nolan (R. Minn.) offered an amendment to exempt artificial limbs, which was adopted.

An amendment by Representative Bland (R. Va.) to exempt sea food containers was defeated as was one by Representative Gifford (R. Mass.), to exempt implements and machinery used in the fishing industry.

Another by Representative Grandfield (D. Mass.), to exclude all wood and coal used in the home was adopted 87 to 12.

An attempt to exempt all coal was rejected as was one to exempt cottonseed oil and peanut oil.

An amendment by Representative Withrow (R. Wis.) which would apply the sales levy to oleomargarine and other butter substitutes, was defeated.

Representative Harlan (D. Ohio) proposed to exempt all things sold to railways in urban, interurban or suburban transportation. His amendment was rejected.

Representative Rainey (D. Ill.) said the Harlan amendment would lose \$48,000,000. "We've done enough for the railroads at one session of congress," Rainey said.

The house also accepted a change by Delegate Houston of Hawaii to exempt from the tax all things sold

to the territories for use in the exercise of governmental functions.
