PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 26 (AP)—Cattle for week 1931, calves 129. During week built of steers and the stock run sold strong to the higher, bulls and calves were about steady. Market Weakens In Wall Street; Several Reasons

NEW YORK, Mar. 26 (AP)—The stock market weakened considerably as trading was restricted for a two-hour weekend session today.

Selling was attributed to several factors, including continued uncertainty over the outcome of the national budget, the adverse report issued in Stockholm by the committee investigating the Ecuador alliance, and weak business surveys generally continued sluggishness of heavy industries.

Although some of the February earnings statements that have just appeared were superior to those expected, such were under consideration. Some of the reasons for the market's weakness were:

1. A new low price for gold, which was down to \$34.00.

2. A new low price for silver, which was down to \$1.10.

3. A new low price for copper, which was down to \$1.10.

4. A new low price for iron, which was down to \$1.10.

Egg Prices Are Being Shaded In Some Quarters

PORTLAND, Mar. 26 (AP)—Egg prices are being shaded in many quarters 1 to 2¢ down below the extreme low prices now generally quoted by the Pacific co-ops. Unexplained growth, selling direct to retailers as well as some outside interests are reported as trying to compete for the trade established by the local co-ops. Sales are reported mainly below the values established by the latter, who are trying to hold prices from going still lower in hope of saving what is left of the industry.

There was no change in the price of butter for the weekend. Late trading in both the cube and print market has been at established prices. Shipping demand has remained favorable.

Further lowering of live chicken prices to a new low level is shown for the weekend. Cash buyers are holding the low for light weight hens and the low for medium. Heavy stuff remains around 15¢. There is talk of 15¢ for heavy butters.

There is a scramble for good quality turkeys with arrivals very limited. Heavy birds are still commanding up to 20¢, while demand better than current supply.

Market for dry codons is showing a loss of 5¢ central in the wholesale trade with buyers unwilling to pay the premium of 5¢. Country demand recently has been practically all.

Wholesale demand for outdoor chicken with general trading around 10¢. For top quality stock demand for broilers is at low level with arrivals of small volume.

Market of wholesale trading. Asparagus market is showing weakness with a general price loss. Sales of top quality 11-12¢ with some small lots as low as 10¢.

Green peas are up in price and lower with increasing supplies from California. Sales mostly 10-12¢ for best.

Crabapples are steady at the low 10¢ level and price and pack stock now available.

Country killed lambs and hogs in good condition with real held weak.

WOOD MARKET

BOSTON, Mar. 26 (AP)—The wood market was restricted the last week as pressure to sell became more apparent. Prominent weakness developed on strictly coming 64's and fine Ohio woods.

Scarcity was noted in the market for the week but became favorable toward accepting low bids that have been firmly refused earlier.

A weak tendency in quotations was noted on all grades as manufacturers persistently refused to take any quantities of wood above current needs, except at very low prices.

Oregon Farmers To Plant More Spring Wheat

—Oregon farmers are expecting to make a material increase in acreage of all crops except beans the coming season as compared to last year with the greatest increase occurring in spring wheat acreage and barley acreage according to the March 1 intentions to plant report of the division of crop and livestock estimates. There are several factors entering in between the time of the March 1 intentions and the actual planting which usually result in more or less extensive changes from the intentions figures. This report merely indicates the farmers' intentions and not the actual acreage which will be planted which usually falls short of the intentions.

The estimates of the planted acreage of the winter wheat and rye crops which are made in December are carried here to show the relationship of the planted to the planted (not harvested) acreage of the previous season.

An increase of 150 per cent or 180,000 acres in the Oregon spring wheat crop is intended this year. Generally no great change is made in our total wheat acreage from season to season, the only change usually occurring being a shift from winter wheat to spring wheat. The extreme dry fall resulted in unfavorable seeding conditions for the fall crop and as a result the acreage seeded fell somewhat short of the 1931 harvested acreage.

Normally then we should expect sufficient increase in spring wheat to balance the drop in fall plantings and whatever abandonment will result from winter injury. Reports indicate that there have been no unusually serious winter kill so that the intentions figure shown by our March first survey is sufficient to account for a material increase in all wheat if intentions are fully realized.

An increase of 5,000 acres or 15 per cent is indicated in the Oregon corn crop acreage. The long winter and general scarcity of feed during the past season has probably tended to stimulate an increase in acreage of grain feed crops, as well as the fact that corn is generally used for feed under ordinary conditions, but which at present are so used because of poor markets. Barley acreage shows the greatest increase of all the feed crops with the 1931 acreage estimated at 111,000 acres, an increase of 50 per cent or 27,000 acres over the 1931 harvested acreage. The old acreage apparently will be increased by 5 per cent, indicating the growers' plan to plant 241,000 acres, compared to 223,000 acres harvested in 1931.

The 42,000 acres of potatoes which were harvested last year will be increased to 45,000 with planting is complete. If farmers' intentions are fully realized, a slight increase of 4 per cent or 18,000 acres is seen on the time hay crop increasing making the 1932 acreage around 360,000 acres. Oregon dry bean acreage is expected to remain the same as the 1,000 acres harvested last season.
