The Garden

GET THE SEED BOXES READY. Seed boxes in the window of the home are a time honored and handy scheme for getting the jump on the season's vegetables of flowering plants. Even in hotbeds and cold frames, it is often convenient to plant choice seeds in boxes for easiest handling.

This can be avoided by putting the boxes together with small screws or by binding them with wire. If heavy enough wood, there will be no trouble but boxes with thin sides are still the most convenient size for sowing small amounts of seeds.

Boxes should have enough holes made in the bottom to permit good drainage. Over these holes should be placed broken flower crocks, or pebbles to prevent the soil leaking through.

Having boxes or seed pans ready, the next matter for attention is a supply of earth. The first thing to do is to get out a supply of soil and bring it into the house and set it away in a basement to dry out to be ready when you want to start seed planting.
