FEDERAL INSPECTION The officers and men of Company E, 186th Infantry, were required to stand the annual federal inspection Monday.

VI. SOCIAL LEGISLATION AND CIVIL LIBERTIES

The vital truth contained in the statement that "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty" was never more applicable to the United States than it is today.

A. People's Rights

THE FREEDOM OF SPEECH. The full observance by courts, police and other governmental officers of the constitutional rights of free speech, free press, freedom of assembly and impartial access to the use of motor and the radio by minority groups.

B. Labor

ABOLISH UNJUST INJUNCTION. No injunction shall be issued except after hearing and trial.

C. Aliens

POLITICAL ASYLUM. Political refugees shall never be denied admission and the right of political asylum shall forever be maintained in the United States.
