(Continued From Page One) vanced by Dr. W. K. Lewis of Massachusetts Institute of Technology under the name of "key components." The result obtained by Dr. Fenske's apparatus is like considering the liquid with it as being a rod of wood. Down in the middle of this rod is a substance which the oil man wants. Formerly he had to cut off the top of the rod and keep whittling it down until he reached the section desired. By Fenske's method he can treat the liquid column as if it were a rod and saw out the section wanted.

SELENIUM IS USED TO FIGHT CANCER

(Continued From Page One) the treatment proves beneficial, it will be another "forward step" but "there remains too much to be established to warrant unqualified enthusiasm." Wasserman, Keyser and other scientists used selenium in fighting cancer tissues but discarded it in every case because while it effectively destroyed cancer cells in rats they used for their experiments, it also killed most of the rats. New Combinations Used Dr. Parr and her associates worked the selenium into hitherto unused combinations, diluted it greatly and said they found when injected into a patient's blood, their new solution not only arrested the growth of cancerous tissue but in many cases destroyed it, this without harmful effects to the patient. They resorted to the x-ray or radium, a known treatment for cancer, in their experiments and found, they said, that the solution of selenium acted as a reflective agent when the rays were applied, creating secondary radium rays. These, and the solution, worked double destruction on the cancer tissues, they said.

Missourians Are Pledged to Reed But Are Not Bound

ST. LOUIS, Mar. 30 (AP)—Missouri's fifty-four delegates to the Democratic national convention in Chicago June 27 will "use all honorable means" to obtain the presidential nomination for former United States Senator James A. Reed, but will not be bound to support him "until personally released," as they were at Houston four years ago. The Democratic state convention here "wholeheartedly and unqualifiedly" endorsed Reed for the presidency, but the convention, other than instructing the delegates to "use all honorable means" in Reed's behalf, made no mention of how long they should support him. The fifty-four delegates will have 36 votes in the convention.

Group Asking For Receivership Must File New Petitions

KANSAS CITY, March 29 (AP)—Federal Judge Merrill E. Otis today allowed plaintiffs asking a receivership for the Long-Bell Lumber corporation and its subsidiaries until 9:30 a. m. Thursday to file amended petitions. In a memorandum last night Judge Otis indicated he would uphold a demurrer to the petitions asking receivership, but added in view of the importance of the case he would permit further arguments. Attorneys for the plaintiffs today asked permission to file amended petitions, rather than argue the merits of those previously presented. The petitioners are William O. Hutson Jr., of Lawrence, Kan., and W. Verne Carson, of Quincy, Ill., who alleged in separate suits in equity that officials of the corporation had damaged its credit and good will by transferring capital assets of the Long-Bell Lumber company to another of the Long-Bell corporation's subsidiaries.

Heavy Earthquake Hits Johannesburg

JOHANNESBURG, Union of South Africa, March 30 (AP)—One of the most severe earthquakes ever recorded here set the buildings a tremble in the center of the city today and caused a heavy rock slip in the shaft of the Robinson deep mine. One of the seismographs at the observatory was put out of action.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY

PORTLAND, Mar. 30 (AP)—Jack Kentworth, 26, ex-convict, indicted for the slaying of Arnold (Johnny) Hansen, 19, Portland boxer, pleaded not guilty when arraigned in circuit court here Tuesday. Hansen was shot to death here Mar. 2. Kentworth was arrested in Klamath Falls two days later. The men quarreled over a woman.

Explosion Wrecks Zagreb Film Studio

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia, Mar. 30 (AP)—Two persons were burned to death and it was feared that many others lost their lives in a fire which destroyed the studios of the Star Film company after a terrific explosion last night. Thirty persons were taken to hospitals, 17 of them in critical condition and the authorities were afraid many others had been buried in the ruins. The cause of the explosion had not been determined this morning as firemen combed the debris for other victims.
