Selling Convergences On Railway Shares In Exchange Today

NEW YORK, Apr. 2 (4) — Selling converged upon the railroad shares in today's short session of the stock market, and price averages penetrated new low levels for the third successive day.

Pressure was relaxed in the last hour, however, and enough short covering appeared to reduce the decline somewhat. Extreme losses of 1 to 4 points were numerous, but many of these were cut in half.

The industrials and utilities generally finished within fractions of yesterday's final level, but several rails were off 1 to 2 points net. The closing tone was heavy. Trading was in fair volume for a two-hour session, transfers approximating a million shares.

Most quarters were inclined to attribute the slump in rails to the lowest prices since the 1890's to fresh uncertainty over the interstate commerce commission's holding up approval of a reconstruction loan to the Baltimore and Ohio to pay off maturing bank notes.

While second quarter freight movement was estimated by the shippers advisory boards as 13 per cent under 1931, against a drop of about 20 per cent in the first quarter, it was recalled that these estimates have recently been too optimistic.

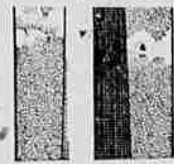

Cut of Another Cent a Pound In Butter Market

PORTLAND, Apr. 2 (4) — Cut of another 1c lb. in the price of cube butter on the produce exchange during the weekend session was practically a foregone conclusion as a result of the liberally increased churning. This applies equally to the immediate Portland territory and to the country points of the northwest.

By the cut the price of extras and standards was dropped to an extreme of 20c lb. with the best call continued in the standards. The public seemingly does not care for the so-called extras.

A very bearish interest buying for California account which has been quoting extreme low prices for chickens, has been the last to come into the open market and pay fractionally better prices.

Owing to the weakness in the general trade for a day or so past, lower prices are being named for mutton and old lambs with the movement outward very much restricted. Spring lambs are nominally steady.

Shaded prices are again showing for country killed hogs as a result of recent depression in the livestock price and underselling by packers in the dressed meat trade. Veal are also inclined to show easiness at the moment.
