Death To Four In Seattle Is Party's Sequel

SEATTLE, April 4 (AP)—Death was the sequel for four persons, three women, to dancing parties here yesterday and today two men were lying near death in a Seattle hospital and two others were recovering from painful injuries received in two automobile accidents.

The dead: Harry Huffman, 17, Burlington. Carl T. Winkquist, 21, Seattle. Mrs. Rachel Tremaine, 23, Seattle. Miss Florence Evans, 23, Seattle.

The injured: Guy Tremaine, 23, husband of Mrs. Tremaine, critical internal injuries. Allan H. R. Birnie, 18, Seattle high school student, internal and head injuries.

John Sneddon, 17, Benton, deep scalp wounds and face injuries. John Peroglio, 19, Benton, broken collar bone and scalp injuries. Winkquist, Miss Evans and Mrs. Tremaine were killed when the car driven by Tremaine, in which they were riding, collided head on with a machine, reported stolen shortly before the accident, driven by Birnie. They had been in a dance at a roadside north of the city.

Huffman was killed when he lost control of his machine and it plunged over an embankment, turning over and pinning him underneath.

Peroglio and Sneddon were riding with Huffman. They had just left a dance hall near Benton when the accident occurred.

FORTESCUE TRIAL UNDER WAY TODAY

and E. J. Lord, a naval enlisted man. These three, with Albert O. Jones, another sailor who was found on guard at the hotel, were charged with the murder of Kahahawai's lynchings.

When the young Hawaiian was abducted he was making his daily rounds of the hotel building pending retrial, with four others, on charges of assaulting Mrs. Thalia Massie, attractive 30-year-old wife of a local doctor and daughter of Mrs. Fortescue.

The full first week of the trial, attorneys said, may be consumed by selection of a jury on which Orientals and islanders may be expected to outnumber the whites. Each side has 25 peremptory challenges.

The trial will be further prolonged by the ruling of Circuit Judge Charles S. Davis, who has referred to himself as the "Clarence Darrow of Honolulu," limiting sessions to three hours daily in deference to Clarence Darrow, brilliant veteran of many court battles who has made defense counsel Judge Davis, presiding, said sessions would be from 9 a. m. to noon (2:30 p. m. to 5:30 p. m., eastern standard time). The small courtroom holds only 75 persons, and these have since been obtained passes, precluding possibility of the general public hearing attorneys unfold their carefully guarded cases. Judge Davis will permit none to stand during session, nor will he allow the curious to throng corridors of the building. Hence the heavy police guard.

Darrow, who has already named "acquittal" as the best present he could receive on his 75th birthday which he expects to pass in the courtroom two weeks from today, is assisted by an array of less noted lawyers.

Against him is John C. Kelley, an Irishman with a "liking for a fight," prosecuting his first important case as public prosecutor—an office created by a special legislative session as a result of demands for reform following the attack on Mrs. Massie, the lynching of Kahahawai, and a series of assaults upon women. Aiding him is Barry Ulrich, suave and relentless in cross-examination, who was retained specifically for this case.

The presiding judge described himself as the "Clarence Darrow of Honolulu" because he specialized in defending those in particularly tight places before he became a prosecutor and subsequently ascended to the bench.

Prof. Blankenship Luncheon Speaker

"John Millington Synge and the Irish Renaissance" in which Professor Blankenship traced the development of Ireland's new literary movement, was the theme of an address delivered by the Whitman college professor, author and authority on contemporary literature before the American Association of University Women, Saturday at a 12:30 luncheon at the Sacajawea Inn. At the business meeting which preceded his address, Mrs. Lawrence Hull was elected president to fill the vacancy left by the resignation of Miss Helen Moor, while Miss Moor was elected to the position of member at large of the executive board.

The Irish Renaissance is the greatest thing which has happened in the world of literature during the past 100 years, Mr. Blankenship believes. Two geniuses have been produced by the movement, William Butler Yeats and John Millington Synge. A genius is a man not touched by his generation, according to the speaker. Yeats, after his discovery by Yeats, went to the Irish islands, the wildest island off the Irish coast on the west, and there he learned the dialect of the people and became familiar with their legends and their superstitions, which he has expressed in "Riders to the Sea" and "Playboy of the Western World."

The ancestors of the modern Irishmen were scattered over Western Europe during Caesar's time, but they were gradually crowded out into Wales, the islands surrounding Ireland and the north of Scotland where they carried their culture, which has now disappeared, but the history has remained, he stated. Since the Celts went to Ireland they have never felt free from subjugation.

They have a gift for poetry and mysticism and a tremendously religious. The Irish have been considered "funny men," but Professor Blankenship believes that their humor was used to keep their hearts from breaking and to lighten the stony road they travel. A few Irishmen found they could make the English rulers laugh and lighten their own load, they established that reputation for the entire country and it has been to the advantage of the English, when opposing home rule for Ireland, to represent the Irish as a lovable but irresponsible people. The Irish have suffered tremendously, and it was partly from that representation Professor Blankenship feels. The stock company Irishman was the pervasion of the young writers of Ireland.

The "midnight of distress" after 1800, when Ireland lost all hope on home rule and the Irish Catholics were taxed to support the church of England established in their midst and the land was ruled by absentee English landlords, the writers decided if Ireland could not have political freedom they established literary freedom. All writers, who are potential politicians in Ireland, decided to concentrate on literature. Through accident, Standish O'Grady found an old Irish history book with the legends of the people and from that book he wrote a history of Ireland, from which has sprung the new movement in Irish literature.

For cold blooded and non-artistic reasons, Synge later achieved immortality with his plays, Mr. Blankenship said. Yeats was one of the lead-

ers in the movement for literary freedom, and when he saw Synge he told him to write, and Synge wrote, producing six masterpieces. He ridiculed the speech of the English rhythm, replacing it with a rhythm from Western Ireland. Yeats discovered Synge in Paris, and exhorted him to stay away from Paris, since he said that Irishmen lost their national characteristics and traits in Paris and ceased to be Irishmen.

The novel has no place in the new Irish literary movement, Mr. Blankenship stated, because it does not fit the genius of the writers. Drama is their forte, since drama is one of the native expressions of people. They have stayed close to the soil and can "taste the flavor of Irish earth," the speaker pointed out.

By 1892 Yeats had started the movement with his play, "Countess Cathleen" and, others assisting him, they started to establish the national art theatre with the aim of expressing the life of a people, by producing only plays of Ireland. The theatre has become the second in the world, the art theatre in Moscow, Russia, being considered the finest. Many of the plays were political satires, and all tend to be tragically static, with the movements unobtrusive, and the effect depending on the lines.

When the theatre was established it was necessary to get plays. Lady Gregory was asked to write, and although she never had before, she tried and the result was extremely good comedies.

Synge returned from Paris, where Yeats found him starting in a garret, writing essays on French writers, and went to the Erin Islands, where the people are extremely fatalistic as shown in their refusal to learn to swim because if they are to be drowned, knowing how to swim will only make it much harder. There he heard tempestuous, brooding, fatalistic talk, and through the knowledge of the people gained on the island he has contributed to the stage an intimate knowledge of the people and speech, but he has gone farther in catching the idiom of people and romanticizing it. "Riders to the Sea" is written about these islands, and Mr. Blankenship calls it the finest one-act tragedy ever written, gray and tragic.

After the death of Synge, the writers have turned to realism, since Synge is said to have made a mould and then broken it.

Members of the nominating committee suggested the officers for the coming year, and their report was unanimously accepted, placing Mrs. Hull as president; Miss Mary Loeffel as vice president; Miss Mary Druley, secretary; and Miss Marie Tighe, treasurer. Members of the committee were Miss Amanda Zabel, Mrs. Robert Eakin, Miss Imogene Russell and Miss Beattie Pettigrew, chairman.

Musical numbers were furnished by Winifred Scott and Eugene Schuster, members of the eighth grade at the Ackerman Training school, under the direction of Miss Jennie Peterson. They were accompanied by Miss Iola Gooding.

The next meeting will be held on May 7, at which time Pendleton, Baker and Walla Walla branches will meet jointly with the local association.

JURY EXONERATES DRIVER
