CHARGES FACING 2 NOTED RUNNERS

Paavo Nurmi and Jules Ladoumègue Both Accused of Professionalism

NEW YORK, April 4 (AP)—Within a month, charges of professionalism have been leveled at two of Europe's greatest runners, Paavo Nurmi of Finland and Jules Ladoumègue of France, and in all probability, neither will be eligible to compete in the Olympics at Los Angeles this summer.

Ladoumègue's name was stricken from the rolls of the French Amateur Athletic Federation on March 4 and yesterday, at Berlin, the International Amateur Athletic Federation suspended Nurmi from all international competition.

The action against Nurmi was taken pending the result of an investigation into the famed Finn's amateur status now being undertaken by the Finnish Athletic Association at the behest of the I.A.A.F.

Details of the charges against Nurmi have been divulged nor would Sigfrid Edstrom of Sweden, president of the I.A.A.F., throw any light on them at Berlin yesterday. It was said, however, that the evidence against the great distance runner was so strong that the suspension was inevitable.

Before they ran into official investigation, both Nurmi and Ladoumègue were regarded as almost certain point winners at Los Angeles.

Ladoumègue, whose 4:09 1-5 mile last August bettered Nurmi's official record of 4:10 4-10 although it has not yet been accepted by the I.A.A.F., was considered one of the most formidable contenders for the Olympic title.

Nurmi, who has established 30 records at distances from one mile to ten and has won six championships in the last three Olympiads, was expected to figure in the scoring in both the marathon and the 10,000 meters.

HOUSTON, Tex., April 4 (AP)—Wilmer Allison of Austin, Tex., has won the singles championship of the second annual Houston Invitation tennis tournament, thereby moving measurably nearer to membership in the United States Davis Cup team.

Jake Hess of Rice Institute, fell before the dashing net and almost flawless volleying of the former University of Texas ace 8-6, 6-3, 6-2, in the finals yesterday.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 4 (AP)—The committee charged with selecting the American swimming team has something to cheer about as a result of the record-breaking performances in the national senior A. U. championships.

Bank of Commerce At Eugene Closed
EUGENE, Ore., April 4 (AP)—The Bank of Commerce, established more than 20 years ago, today was taken over by the state banking department for liquidation.

The bank has 2000 commercial accounts and about 1500 savings accounts. Deposits declined from a peak of \$1,300,000 in 1928 to \$463,000 at present, necessitating action by the state to save the remaining resources.

A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, said not more than 10 per cent of the total assets of Eugene will be tied up by the closing of the bank.
