

Price Cutting In Eggs Is General Along the Coast

PORTLAND, Apr. 6 (AP) - Price cutting in the egg market appears more or less general along the Pacific slope. Prices are being quoted in the north and in the south that are not generally available. In Portland the local co-ops are quoting the price they are actually selling at. Some outsiders and a few local interests are reported selling below established prices of the co-ops.

Considerable undergrade stock is reported as offering as fresh goods. Receipts of eggs continue very liberal. General trend of the butter trade continues more or less of weak character but without further price change during the Wednesday trading. Butterfat values are relatively weak.

Cut of 1c lb. in the price of cheese at Tillamook is announced. The new selling price at the cheese city is 14c for triplets and 15c for loaf. The cut follows general weakness and price slashes.

First carload of strawberries for the 1932 season is due to arrive in Portland in time for the Thursday trade with the price around \$1.75 crate of 12s.

First head lettuce of the season out of the Phoenix, Ariz., district was reported in during the day; a carload being received. Quality was very favorable and priced \$4 with Imperial \$3 top.

While confirmation was lacking, reports in this market indicate the sale of at least two carloads of onions at Willamette valley points at \$5, a loss of around \$1.50 @ \$1.50 from recent high marks. Local jobbing market is slow and inclined weaker.

Notes of wholesale trading: Rhubarb market is weaker with a big increase in the supply. Country killed hogs are weaker but other lines just holding.

Chicken trade suggests a good demand except for very small broilers which are really depressed. New potatoes are just about steady to a little lower.
