State Christian Endeavor Meet To Be April 21-24

Rev. E. L. Reiner, Chicago, At Portland Conclave, La Granders Invited.

Plans are fast progressing for the Christian Endeavor state convention to be held on April 21 to 24. The Thursday evening, Friday and Saturday sessions are to be conducted in the First Presbyterian church at 12th and Adler streets. Sunday afternoon and evening the convention will meet in the municipal auditorium in order to care for the large crowd expected then.

Rev. E. L. Reiner, of Chicago, will address the convention Thursday, Friday and Sunday evenings. On Saturday morning, James M. Cornelison, missionary to the Unatilla Indians near Pendleton, will relate some of his experiences. Sunday afternoon, the Dr. Donald W. M. MacCheser, pastor of the Rose City Park Community church of Portland will be heard in the session at the auditorium.

The annual Christian Endeavor parade will be the Friday afternoon feature. In the evening Oregon delegates to last summer's world convention at San Francisco will hold a banquet. The Young People and In-

termediate groups will have their banquets on Saturday evening. Denominational luncheons are being planned for Saturday by the Christian, Congregational, Evangelical, Presbyterian and United Brethren groups. These will be presided over by the respective denominational leaders. A program of instrumental and vocal music will form the Saturday evening feature as no address is to be given then. John Kilpack of Portland is making the arrangements for music during the convention.

Conferences dealing with all phases of Christian Endeavor work will be conducted throughout the convention. Among those who will lead these are: Paul Brown, Pacific coast field secretary; Ross Guller, Oregon field secretary; Dr. Walter Myers, pastor counselor; James Cornelison, Delina Brown, Ernest Peterson, Pearl Sherlock, Helen McClay, Dorothy Kliska, Irene Welch, Mrs. Frank Ritchey, Rev. L. H. Willard, Fay Steinmetz, and O. L. Paris.

The Southern Pacific has granted special rates and large groups are expected to come by rail.

First Methodist Episcopal Church Fourth Street at Spring Avenue W. H. Hertzog, pastor.

A tract from "Campana," sung by Paul Knautz and Sherwood Williams will be received with much interest by the congregation of the Methodist church, where both Mr. Knautz and Mr. Williams are members of the choir and well known soloists. They

will furnish the duet at the morning service at 11 o'clock, at which time the pastor will speak on the sermon subject, "Disastrous Success." The choir will sing the anthem, "All Hail The Power." The evening services of the church is combining with the Epworth league to the extent that the worship service of the league will be the evening service and will follow the discussion. The young people will meet at 7 o'clock and study the lesson, "Youth and the New America," in which the characteristics of the American will be studied under the leadership of Fred Hertzog. The evening service will then begin at 7:40, and the sermon topic will be "Needed, a Sense of Humor."

Sunday school will convene at 9:45 in the morning, with the various ages enjoying different classes.

Family day will be observed at the Baptist church on Sunday, and members of families are asked to sit together at the morning service at 11 o'clock. An illustrated junior program will be delivered by the pastor, and the service will be played by Mrs. St. John, pianist. The choir will furnish a special anthem.

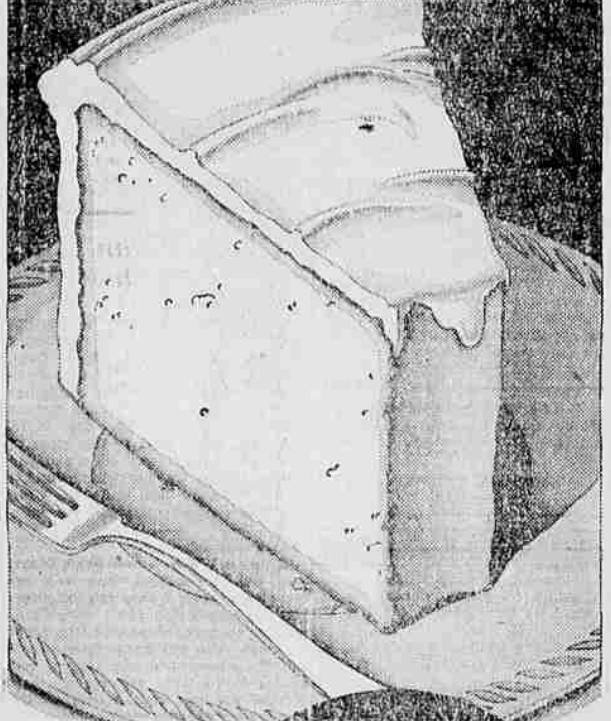
Already 23 lines have been suppressed, and before the year is out eleven more will have gone into the discard in favor of 50-passenger auto buses.
