Egg Prices Are Lower Locally; Peppers Lower

Eggs are quoted at 15 cents a dozen for fresh extras on the local market today, 3c less than the price quoted at this time in 1931. Mediums sell for 12½c a dozen, while mixed are quoted at 10 cents.

Butter is selling at the present time at 25 cents a pound, with occasional special prices by various stores which drop below that price. Green peppers are becoming more plentiful and are now being sold at 30c a pound rather than the former price of 35c.

Other prices on the public market remain the same.

PORTLAND LIVESTOCK

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 9 (P) — Cattle 1648, calves 132 for week. Market showed little price change, but the undertone appeared more or less uncertain. Bulls were about steady, but weaners and calves were around half dollar lower. Top steers reached up to \$7.00, but only few moved at that price. Bulk of the better grade steers scaled \$5.00 to \$6.85; for less desirable quality \$4.50 and down; some mixed lots of steers and heifers of the yearling or baby beef order sold at \$6.65, but best heifers were rarely above \$6.25 to \$6.50, while cows sold \$5.25 for extreme quality; cutter to good bulls were in a few instances above \$4.00, but the bulk ranged at \$2.50 to \$3.50; weaners and calves ranged \$2.50 to \$6.50, with a general top of \$6.00.

Hogs 6265 for week, with market under pressure practically entire period. Latest trading in best light butchers was around \$4.90 for extreme top, which is at least 35c below the ruling figures a week ago. Week started with loss of 10c in swine with a general top of \$5.25, but values ebbed the entire period. Overweight and underweight offerings scaled \$4.00 to \$4.50 during the fore-part of the week for bulk offerings, although as high as \$4.75 was reached; nothing above \$4.00 was listed at the final. Packing hogs sold \$3.00 to \$3.25 early in the week. Feeder pigs sold at \$3.50 to \$4.00 toward weekend.

Sheep and lambs 4020 for week. Trade in general was weaker and lower for all offerings, including spring lambs. Some California new crop appeared during week and sold at \$8.00, which was extreme top. Old crop lamb or yearlings were down about 50c for week with \$5.00 to \$5.50 the general top; ewes sold generally \$2.50 to \$3.00 for better grades.

Butter Prices Are Shaded By Bigger Stores

PORTLAND, Apr. 9 (P) — Someone is cutting butter prices to the big stores for the latter are in many instances offering supplies to consumers at actually less than is being quoted by creamery interests.

There was no change in the price of cubes on the produce exchange for the weekend session. All values appeared steady even though secret cutting appears more or less general.

Make of butter showed a rather fair increase in Portland plants during the week but a greater increase was shown in shipments from country plants.

Butterfat values are steady in general with practically no fights among buyers at country points.

There is still a lack of change in open market prices on eggs here with much the same condition reflected in leading markets of the country. Storage operations are being pushed to take care of the surplus.

While there continues weakness for light weight broilers because of the persistent dumping by the Centralia-Chehalis section, there was no open change for the weekend. Other chickens are firmly held.

In the market for turkeys general trade appears unusually favorable considering the season. Prices are intact at the point where they have been for several weeks. Best call continues for hens.

Quite good trading tone continues at the weekend for fancy quality country killed calves. Late receipts have been moderate with some gain in the call. Lambs are steady but hogs are weak.

Because of the Oregon state laws which not only call for extreme poundage tax as well as for a special tag tax, practically all fishing operations for salmon are out of Washington north with a higher price forced for salmon here and fishermen spending their money elsewhere.

Prices are being shaded generally in the market for onions here. Wholesale are cutting their prices in order to force a suitable movement and clean up. Country sales are also inclined lower although few cars remain.

Indicated Output Of Wheat Is Given By States Today

WASHINGTON, Apr. 9 (P) — Details of the indicated production of winter wheat in important producing states this year, as estimated from the condition of the crop on April 1, were announced today by the department of agriculture.

The indicated total crop for the country was placed at 458,000,000 bushels by the department yesterday as compared with 787,465,000 bushels last year.

The condition of the crop on April 1 and indicated production for important producing states follow:

Pennsylvania, condition 90 per cent of normal, and indicated production 15,700,000 bushels; Ohio 88 and 29,600,000; Indiana 83 and 22,800,000; Illinois 81 and 23,000,000; Michigan 86 and 13,800,000; Missouri 80 and 19,000,000; Nebraska 87 and 29,000,000; Kansas 84 and 98,500,000; Oklahoma 74 and 38,000,000; Texas 76 and 500,000; Colorado 82 and 6,000,000; Washington 83 and 26,000,000.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Apr. 9 (P) — Trade in wool during the week continued dull. The limited amount of business closed was mostly on the finer grades at prices about steady as compared with the previous week. The attitude of buyers was a little more favorable as contacts with the wool market were somewhat more frequent than during the previous two weeks. While the situation continued unsettled, a steadier tone was in evidence.

BUTTER PRICES DECLINE

CORVALLIS, Ore., Apr. 9 (P) — Pacific coast butter prices declined rather sharply during the past week although the storage demand which developed late in the week halted the decline, according to a review issued today by the Oregon State college extension service and the federal market bureau.

Jobbing prices on 92 and 93 score butter at Portland were 21 and 22 cents, a decline of 2 cents since April 1, and of 4 cents since March 1.

airplane carriers, bombing aircraft and chemical and bacteriological warfare.

The fascist council's statement contained five principal recommendations for economic rehabilitation of the world. Besides settlement of the reparations and war debts question, these were:

Removal of the shackles on international trade; solution of the economic difficulties of Danubian and Balkan countries; revision of the peace treaties and an end to too frequent international conferences.

Something must be done to restore international commerce before a condition of "total anemia" has been reached in the trade of all countries, the council's statement said. It did not go into the details of a solution, however.

The peace treaties, it said, "carry in themselves the causes of inquietude and war" and too frequent international conferences lead to false hopes among the people which "are followed always by graver disillusion."

Italy to insist

The resolution added that Italy intends to insist on its proposal at Geneva until the end of the conference "to clear finally in the face of this grave problem, the historical and political responsibility of individual states."

The fascist council's statement today makes Italy the first government to declare officially for cancellation of reparations and war debts. Although the statement represents only an advisory opinion technically, it is Mussolini's advice as head of the fascist grand council to Premier Mussolini, chief of the Italian government.

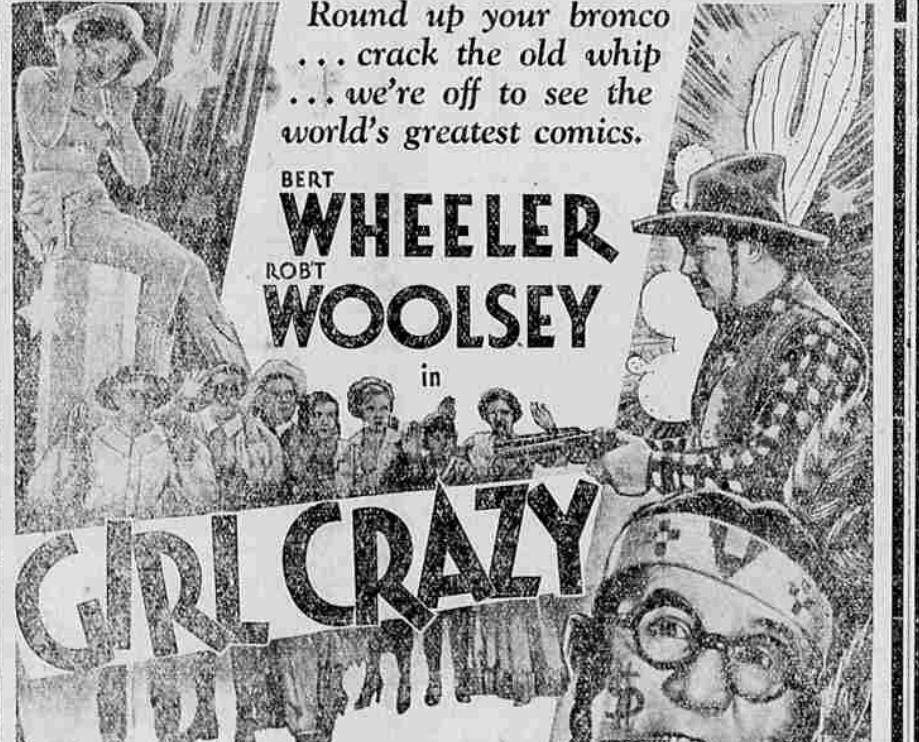

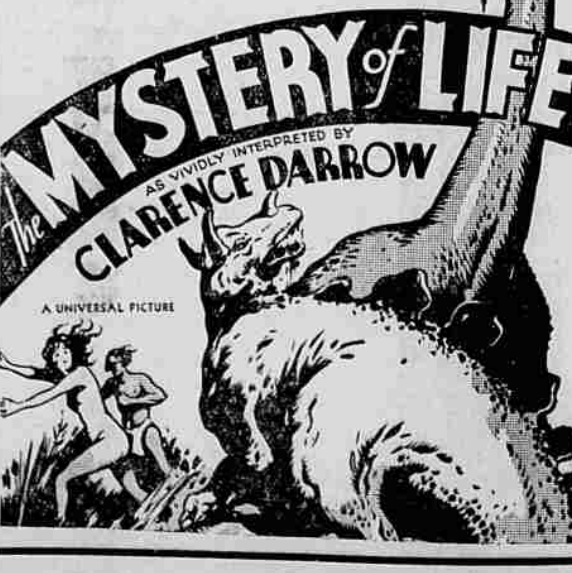
