In 1920 there were 73 permanent symphony orchestras in the U. S. Only nine of these were founded before 1910 and about 50 per cent of the balance have been organized within the last 10 years.

The symphonic band, which contains instruments not found in the ordinary band, is so named because of the effort to duplicate the colorings of the symphony orchestra.

Airplanes' Dangers

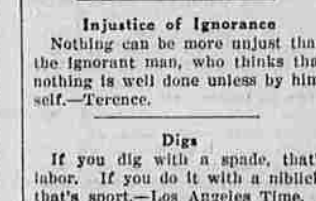

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- Apple Sauce Sugar Cookies Dinner Broiled Lamb Chops Buttered Potatoes Escalloped Cabbage Biscuit Honey Apple Salad Nut Cake White Frosting Coffee Mince Ham Filling (For Sandwiches) 2-3 cup chopped, cooked ham 1-3 cup chopped celery 1 hard cooked egg, sliced 2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickles 1 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon chopped onion 3 tablespoons salad dressing

Escalloped Cabbage

4 tablespoons butter 6 tablespoons flour 2 1/2 cups milk 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon celery salt 3 cups chopped, cooked cabbage 2-3 cup cracker crumbs 3 tablespoons butter, melted Melt 4 tablespoons of butter and add flour. Blend and add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Add seasonings. Blend and add cabbage. Pour into shallow, buttered baking dish and cover with crumbs which have been mixed with melted butter. Bake 25 minutes in moderate oven. Serve in dish in which baked.

Apple Salad

3 cups sliced apples 1/2 cup diced celery 1/4 cup broken nuts (peanuts) 1-3 cup dressing

Chill ingredients. Combine and serve. Nut Cake 2-3 cup fat 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 cup milk 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon salt 3 cups flour 3 teaspoons baking powder 2 egg whites, beaten 1/2 cup nuts Cream the fat and sugar. Add milk, vanilla, salt, flour and baking powder. Beat 2 minutes. Fold in rest of ingredients. Pour into loaf pan lined with waxed paper. Bake 40 minutes in moderately slow oven. Cool and frost.
