The Garden

SPRING FEEDING OF PLANTS

Trees, shrubs, flowers and lawns need periodic feedings to keep them in best growing condition. The proper food for plants is one which contains all the necessary elements of growth and it is best that it be in a balanced form.

Fortunately for the owner of a city or town home there are now readily available commercially prepared plant foods which are easy to apply, convenient to handle, not very expensive, and which, through experiment, have been established to contain all the necessary elements for plant growth. This is the type of plant food most practical for the city home owner to use and one which will serve his purpose to perfection.

Shrubs — On established shrub plantings apply the food in the spring before the soil is worked. Where maximum results are desired it is advisable to feed the shrubs six weeks after the initial application. For newly planted shrubs it is advisable that the food be mixed with the soil at the time they are planted.

Trees — Usually trees are left to grow the best they can under the circumstances, but periodic feedings will promote a healthy growth and keep the trees in much better condition. Established trees need to be fed but once a year in the following manner:

Make holes in the soil with a crowbar or other sharp instrument to a depth of 12 to 16 inches under the drip of the branches of the tree. Fill the holes half full of plant food and then complete the filling with soil. In case of newly planted trees it is advisable to mix the plant food with the soil at the time of planting.

Perennials — A surface application of plant food to the perennial bed in the spring will be found very beneficial in promoting vigorous growth of the plants. On the plants vigor depends the size and number of flowers produced, and as perennials are gross feeders it is necessary that sufficient plant food be given them from time to time to prevent the soil from becoming exhausted.

Lawns — In making new lawns it is advisable to incorporate the plant food in the soil a few days before final seeding if possible. For established lawns an early spring feeding of plant food at the rate recommended by the manufacturer will be found very beneficial in promoting root growth and establishing a thicker lawn. Periodic lawns will be found to promote the growth of the grass sufficiently so the grass itself will have a tendency to crowd out weeds, at least the thickening of the turf will prevent further inroads of these detestable pests.

Roosevelt Laughs In Discussing Al Smith's Attack

ALBANY, N. Y., Apr. 15 (AP)—Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, in a jocular mood, disclosed that a friend had telephoned him to say:

"Wasn't that a terrible attack 'Al' made on 'Alfalfa Bill' Murray?"

It was the governor's only comment on the speech made by former Governor Alfred E. Smith in Washington last night, in which the former governor declared he would "take off his coat and vest and fight to the end any demagogic appeal to the masses of the working people."

Smith did not directly mention Roosevelt's name in his speech.

The Oklahoma governor's most recent charge that the Roosevelt workers were buying votes in Iowa and North Dakota received the same silent attention that Mr. Roosevelt gave the Smith speech.

Cherry's Advance 3 Cents

THE DALLES, Ore., Apr. 15 (AP)—While no definite market has been set here on black cherries, and the harvest still is 10 weeks away, the Stadelman Fruit company has announced it is sufficiently confident in this season's deal to guarantee growers with whom it is now contracting, an advance of 3 cents a lb. when the fruit is picked.

The company handles a heavy tonnage of cherries from The Dalles orchards, and has contracted with independent shippers in the Hood River and White Salmon, Wash., districts. It is estimated the company will ship 25 cars of black cherries from Hood River and White Salmon.
