Butter Market Steadier; Eggs Are Unchanged

PORTLAND, Apr. 16 (AP)—Market for butter indicates general steadiness. This is perhaps due more to the fact that retailers have awakened to the fact that they have not only been selling supplies at cost or less but they have not aided their trade in the least. Most retailers who had been slaughtering the price of butter from 1 to 3c lb. below actual established wholesale figures, were at the weekend asking a profit.

Naturally this had a good effect upon the demand for supplies from the trade which had lost most of its butter business to the price slashers. Increasing make of butter is being fairly well taken care of by the increased demand from the home territory. The percentage of extras is naturally increasing.

Talk in the trade is of the establishment of the print price on the basis of extras. It is proposed to ask the extra cube price for prime first, 1c advance for standard and 2c above extras for prints of that grade. Heretofore there have been three different standards of price fixing, resulting in great disturbance to the trade generally.

Trading in the local egg market is still unchanged as to price and volume of demand. Movement into receivers while fresh consumption is just about normal.

At the weekend there was no further change in the general market for live chickens. Broilers remain weak for the smaller stuff, while heavy weights of the colored type are fairly steady as are heavy hens.

Weather conditions are against receipts of dressed poultry in good shape here, therefore the general trade advises against stock being shipped in that manner. The rabbit season is reported over.

Additional carload lots of strawberries are reported in from both Central and the Los Angeles valley with resulting ease of an already low price list. Quality is almost uniformly good.

Trade in the asparagus market is now considered steady with most sales of long green around 90c @ \$1.00 doz. bunches. California stock is being cleaned up at whatever it will bring, generally a nickel, a couple of cents.

Decreased receipts of cauliflower are shown locally with only a nominal movement reported out of the Umpqua valley. Demand is steady with prices generally about unchanged.

Carload arrivals of California strawberries for the weekend were of very good quality. The Los Angeles stock sold lower at \$1.25 @ \$1.50 for 12s with state stuff at \$1.00 while new Fresno 20s sold mostly \$3.00.

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 16 (AP)—Cattle 1891, calves 105 for week. In general there was practically no change in cattle market price list for week. Best steers sold again up to \$7.00, in line with last week's values.

High medium to good sorts sold \$6.00 @ \$6.85 with lower grades at extreme of \$5.85; heifers moved around \$6.25 top, although strictly good stuff was quotable 25c better; best cows were \$5.25, but prevailing price was around \$4.75; cutter to good bulls scaled \$3.75 down to \$2.50; vealers and calves ranged \$2.50 @ \$6.50.

Hogs 569 for week. Trade started out under pressure at week's opening, with closing values still sharply lower than week ago. Killer stuff in general closed with loss 30 to 40c with feeders down perhaps 50c. On Monday best hogs ruled \$4.50 general top and bulk, but later 10c better was secured; best light butchers sold \$4.60 top, over and underweight sorts sold \$3.50 @ \$4.00, with packing hogs \$3.00 @ \$3.50; feeders scaled around \$3.50 during the period.

Sheep and lambs 2313 for week. Trade in general was inclined to show further price reduction. Best spring lambs were not quoted above \$7.00 during the period with old crop \$1.00 below this. Throwouts were down to \$4.50; common stuff in old lambs sold as low as \$3.00; best yearlings were \$4.00, with cull to choice ewe stock \$1.00 @ \$3.00.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Apr. 16 (AP)—Trade in wool the last week was practically at a standstill on all lines. Quotations on wools were largely unchanged, but the lack of business to test prices, made it impossible to determine whether quotations were representative of market values. Dealers, however, were not inclined to push sales.

Storage Receivers Still Uncertain

CORVALLIS, Ore., Apr. 16 (AP)—Although storage holdings for butter in country as a whole are only 50 per cent of a year ago the attitude of storage receivers is still uncertain with an inclination to keep floors cleared, according to the O. S. C. federal market service.

Cold storage holdings at San Francisco increased only 90,000 pounds during the past week compared to an increase of 103,000 pounds the previous week.

Prices for butter on Pacific coast markets held steady during the past week except at Seattle where all grades declined one to two cents. Prices at eastern markets also tended lower.

Butter production on the coast still is about 10 per cent below last year. More cows are being milked in nearly all important producing centers but the output has not increased proportionately because of poor pastures and enforced curtailment of supplementary feeding.

Stocks Unable To Continue Recovery

NEW YORK, Apr. 16 (AP)—Stocks were unable to continue their recovery through a third session today, although the bond market still felt the stimulating effect of the federal reserve's credit expansion program.

Trading quarters were inclined to look upon the upturn in the stock market of the last two sessions as largely a technical rebound, to await something in the way of favorable news before trying to press the rally further. Enough weekend profit taking and selling came into the market to cause numerous recessions of fractions to more than 2 points from yesterday's close.

The list pushed up a little at the start, slid back, then hardened for a time as copper had a temporary return, but sold off again in the final dealings, and the closing was heavy. Trading was quiet. Turnover approximated half a million shares.
