Sacramento Noses Out Portland Four Games to Three in California

Seattle's Indians profited most from the Sunday doubleheader on the Pacific Coast baseball diamonds. Trimming the Oaks twice they moved up from seventh to fifth place in the league ladder. The Missions and Angels improved their percentages in games won, though they divided honors respectively with the Seals and Hollywood Stars.

Seattle stepped on Oakland in the morning game 7 to 2 and then blanked the Oaks 4 to 0 in the afternoon to take the series. Phil Page, pitched a one-hit game for the tribe in the second contest. Ernie Johnson, Seattle manager in bed with a cold, was not needed with George Burns taking his place, but thought the double win "good medicine."

Sac Win Series, 4-3
Sacramento and Portland divided the day's games, with the series honors going to the Senators. The morning game, played in Stockton, was 6 to 3 for Sacramento, but Portland took the afternoon contest in the capital 10 to 5, Jimmy Moore settling matters with a homer with two on.

Hollywood and Los Angeles added a game apiece to both their winning and losing totals for the season, with the Stars grabbing the first game 5 to 4 after 11 innings, and yielding the second 5 to 2. The last game was called in the sixth as the Stars caught a train for Seattle.

Seals Finally Beaten
The league leading Seals gave the Missions their only win of the series in the second game of the doubleheader played here. The morning contest went to the Seals 7-4, though the Missions pounded Caster and Wolf for 13 hits. The afternoon score was 9 to 3, with Art Lieber, Mission hurler, holding the Seals well subdued.

Pitching Duels Frequent In Big Leagues Already

Not since the days before the lively ball have major league pitchers demonstrated such striking early-season mastery.

The season is barely a week old yet they have written into the records 13 games in which the opposition made not more than five hits.

Dazzy Vance of Brooklyn and Hal Schumacher of the Giants have contributed two-hit masterpieces. Vic Sorrell and Earl Whitehill of Detroit and St. Johnson of Cincinnati have pitched three-hit games. Monte Weaver of Washington and Whitlow Wyatt of Detroit have four-hit contests.

The five-hit hurlers include Pat Caraway of the Chicago White Sox, and Dick Coffman and Sam Gray of the St. Louis Browns; Ed Baecht of the Boston Braves, Ed Holley of the Phillies, and Guy Bush of the Chicago Cubs.

Giants' Shufout Braves
Schumacher, young St. Lawrence university graduate, pulled the Giants out of a slump with his excellent effort yesterday and enabled them to beat the Braves, 6-0. Johnny Vergez, home run with the bases filled was the big blow in the Giant attack. Urbanski got both of the hits Schumacher allowed.

Holley's five-hit game gave the Phillies a 2-0 triumph over Brooklyn in 11 innings. A single by Chuck Klein, double by Don Hurst and triple by Hal Lee decided the duel. Bush stopped the world champion St. Louis Cardinals cold and the Cubs won 4-1 with Riggs Stephenson driving in three runs. Pittsburgh scored three runs in the ninth to beat Cincinnati, 4-3, in the other National League game.

In the American league, St. Louis nosed out the Detroit Tigers, 1-0, although Vic Sorrell allowed only three hits. A pass to Goslin, followed by a sacrifice and Kress' single produced the winning run in the eighth. Coffman gave the Tigers five scattered singles.

Earnshaw Fans 12 Men
George Earnshaw fanned 12 men as the Philadelphia Athletics trounced Washington, 11 to 3. The A's grove Fred Marberry out of the box in the fourth inning and battered three other Senators hurlers over the rest of the route. Jimmy Foxx hit his third homer.

Cleveland stopped the Chicago White Sox, 6-1, on a six-hit pitching performance by old George Connelly, a White Sox castoff. Willie Kamm, another former White Sox star, collected three hits, was walked twice, drove in four runs and scored another.

Cold weather forced postponement of the New York Yankees-Boston Red Sox game at Boston. Ruth came down with grippe. The Babe did not expect to travel with the team for an exhibition game at Springfield today but probably will start in the double-header Tuesday.

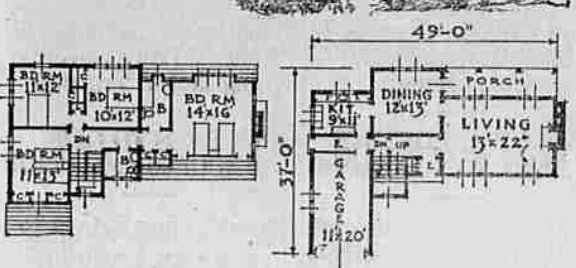
Boy Speaks First Time After 97 Operations

HOMES LIKE RACE HORSES

Careful hand work and attention to details play an important part in the appearance of this low English cottage.
In the exterior, brick is predominant interspersed with stone, and above the entrance door is overlapped hand adzed siding. This same siding extends around over the main gable end up to the bird house.
Woodwork around windows and doors is of hand hewn stock in natural finish or antiqued gray. The roof is variegated gray-black slate or flat tile, and chimney pots are dull red terra cotta. The wall should be of well-toned dark and light bricks. This wall should be well groomed with planting and vines.
The interior has a large living room, dining room and kitchen, and upstairs are four bedrooms and two baths.
Approximate cost of construction is from \$10,000 to \$12,000, depending upon local condition, prevailing labor and material markets and the owner's choice of materials. The house should be located on a lot at least 75x100 or 150 feet, and placed at least 30 feet back from the sidewalk line.
