Stock Exchange Inquiry Brings Out Many Facts

NEW YORK (AP)—The Wall Street bear finds himself performing in the spotlight again as a congressional committee inquires if he is responsible for new low stock prices.

Richard Whitney, president of the New York stock exchange, answering these questions before the senate banking committee, denied there had been bear raids recently, and said he doubted the possibility of them.

Whitney, on several occasions, has held the stock market declines have been the result of business conditions; that the amount of short selling has been of minor import in causing price drops.

STOCK EXCHANGE In Sinking Spell NEW YORK, April 18 (AP)—The stock market had a quiet sinking spell today, carrying several leading issues into new low ground for the 1929-32 decline, but trading dwindled to the smallest volume in weeks. The turnover was well under a million shares, but there were several net losses of 1 to 4 points. The closing tone was heavy.

WOOL BUSINESS LIGHT PORTLAND, April 18 (AP)—Recent sale of around 45,000 lbs. of wool in the Yakima valley, the largest confirmed deal of the season in the Pacific Northwest to date, is practically the only business in the interior. The price was reported at 11c lb. The shearing was understood to be among the best of that territory. Shearing is now general all through the Inland Empire of Washington and initial operations are reported in the Echo, Ore. territory.

LONDON, April 18 (AP)—The fine selection offered at the wool auction today met a better demand from the home trade and the continent at prices generally in the seller's favor. There were 7,613 bales offered and 6,518 were sold.
