

Trade Trend Of Butter Without Changes Today

PORTLAND, Apr. 19 (AP) — There was practically no change in the butter trade trend for the day. Late session of the produce exchange reflected steadiness in all lines with the recent lead of extras maintained. There is growing agitation in the trade for changing the basis of print prices so that extras alone will form the price foundation.

Trading in the egg market reflects a generally steady tone locally with no change in the general price list. Demand for current arrivals is sufficient to take care of offerings in that line.

Despite the weakness generally reported for broilers, there appears quite a fair call for Leghorns weighing 1 1/2 lbs. and better. The real weakness is in lighter stock.

Slight improvement is suggested in the market for country killed hogs along the wholesale way with trading 60-65c lb. for best light blockers with heavy stuff in proportion.

Some further downward price movement has been forced in the market for dressed spring lamb with a range of 14-15c for top stuff. Weakness is most apparent in yearlings owing to the liberal supplies. Poor quality spring lambs are harder to move. Veal appears steady.

Firm trade tone is showing for asparagus as a result of liberal decrease in northwest offerings. Sales up to \$1.15 @ \$1.25 doz. bunches. Some California still available.

While top prices were not changed for the day, weather conditions appear against the strawberry market. Cleanups were reported considerably below general prices.

First carload of Cochemba, Cal., wax onions of the season is now rolling toward Portland and is due to arrive here about Friday. In the meantime there is a scramble for old crop Oregon wax with only a few scattering sacks in sight.

Notes of wholesale trading: Some California green beans are offering and reported in good shape at 25c lb.

Cauliflower is scarce and best Roseburg stock has been advanced to \$1.50 crate. Local stock mostly very poor.

Small increase in hothouse tomato offerings, but demand is sufficient to clean up at former values.

Both old and new potatoes are unchanged in price.

Demand for spinach is excellent with prices well held.

NEW YORK, Apr. 19 (AP) — Shares of the American Telephone and Telegraph company sold under their par value of \$100 on the New York stock exchange today for the first time since 1921.

Their relatives left the exchange with only one common issue quoted above \$100—that of Homestake Mining company.

American Telephone, which closed yesterday at \$100, opened at \$99.87 for a block of 5,000 shares, and subsequently sold lower. Only six times previously in this century had the above been quoted under par.

In 1921 they reached a low of \$95.75. In 1920 they touched \$92.12 and in 1907 reached \$88. Other years that saw violation of par were 1917, 1918 and 1919.

Plans Go Ahead For The Summer Health Round-up

The Summer Round-up of the children is a campaign to send to the entering grade of school a class of children as free as possible from remediable physical and mental defects, according to the parent teacher associations which are planning the event, to be held on Monday, May 2, at several specified clinics in the city.

The ultimate goal is to educate parents to the need for early periodic examinations of their children by the family physician and dentist in order to insure correction of harping defects which might not otherwise be discovered until the child enters school. It is said, until parents become fully educated to the responsibility of the health of their children, the Summer Round-up will be necessary.

Miss Alice Marquardt, chairman of the Summer Round-up of pre-school children, and Mrs. Nellie Bean, vice chairman, are busy with plans for getting the parents to bring their children to the free clinic to be held here.

The clinics have been announced through the Foley building, used by North Powder, Riveria and Greenwood; Sommer building by Union and Central; Island building by Willow and J. H. Ackerman; Sacajawea Annex by Grand City Cove, Elgin, Imbler and Willowsdale.

The pre-school clinics are sponsored by the La Grande City Council of Parent Teacher Associations, which are being held at the following times: 30-40s 1/4 to 4 1/2c; 40-50s 3/4 to 3 1/2c.

Senate Inquiry Of Wall Street Scents 'Dummies'

WASHINGTON, Apr. 19 (AP) — In the belief that many of the names in the list of 24,000 short sales presented for the stock market inquiry represent "dummies" for important principals, some of the senate's banking committee members today advocated uncovering the real traders.

The committee held its inquiry in abeyance until Thursday, to give William A. Gray, of Philadelphia, its new counsel, time to go through the tremendous list of transactions. Administration senators, among them the Republican leader, Watson, of Indiana, reiterated their determination to go to the bottom of the subject and determine what influences have been depressing the market.

The list of short traders' names was guarded from publication but senators who have seen it said the great majority were unknown, leading to the belief expressed by some that in the larger transactions either fictitious names or those of agents for big operators had been used.

When the committee resumes Thursday, Richard Whitney, president of the exchange, will be recalled to the stand. In a sharp all-day cross examination yesterday, he testified that the market would have had to close after England went off the gold standard if short selling had not been prohibited.

He refused to admit that the ban was imposed because of a fear of demoralization from short selling, but said it was decided upon to force the shorts to cover through buying and thus provide a bolstering influence in the face of widespread liquidation.
