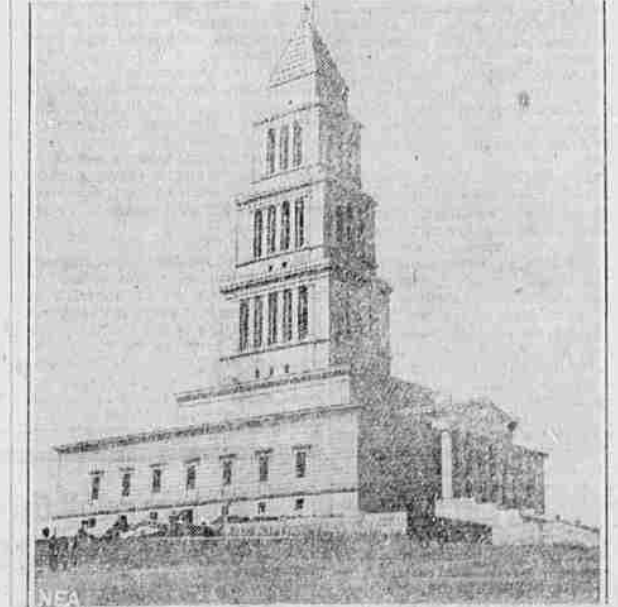

HOOPER OPPOSED TO STRAIGHT CUT

Stagger Plan Upheld By President—11 Per Cent Slash Disliked.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 23 (AP)—Strongly opposed to proposals for a straight cut in the salaries of government employees, President Hoover believes that if this course is taken together with reduction in federal appropriations now in prospect between 50,000 and 75,000 government workers must be discharged. The president has been watching closely developments in congress on the 11 per cent pay cut proposed by the house economy committee and the plan of staggering employment through five day week-end furloughs without pay suggested by the administration.

Vote Due Next Week

A vote upon the controversy is due in the house next week. Mr. Hoover feels that a moral and social responsibility rests upon the government to take care of its own. He has been informed that many branches of business and industry have attempted to maintain as great employment as possible through staggering employment, and he believes the government should assume leadership in this field.

Further, as he pointed out recently, he feels that a straight pay cut plan will save only \$67,000,000 an year against \$82,000,000 to be gained through the stagger plan. The chief executive feels, also, that the question of a five-day or shortened working week will be a necessity in the course of the return of business and industry to normalcy.

(Continued From Page One) control of the delegation to the Republican national convention for the first time in 28 years. Chapple said he was taking "my stand with President Hoover that the real issue today is whether we are to go on with our American system."

"It is time that the poison peddlers be driven to cover," he added. "It is time that the disciples of destruction be repudiated. Upon this issue I shall go before the citizens of Wisconsin. American history will be made in Wisconsin, for we are deciding with our eyes open, whether we are to continue along the upward road toward an ever finer American civilization, or whether we are to slide down the chute-the-slides toward socialism and communism." The senatorial primary is September 20.
