

# Eastern Oregon Track Meet To Be Held At Union Tomorrow

## WOODIE SELECTS LA GRANDE HIGH TEAM FOR EVENT

### Tigers Favored to Wrest Honors From Pendleton, Mac-Hi, Union and Other Schools.

La Grande High school will be represented by 27 athletes at the Eastern Oregon track and field meet at Union tomorrow in defense of the Tigers' championship won last spring. Coach R. Woodie announced this morning.

The track meet will begin at 10 a. m. when preliminaries in the sprints, hurdles and four field events will start, with the final events scheduled for 2 p. m. Besides La Grande and Union, other schools entering include Pendleton, Milton-Freewater, Ontario, Cove, Imbler and possibly other schools in this section. Track meets do not go out for track this spring.

Relay Team Picked

One of the most difficult relay team selections in years confronted Coach Woodie, with nearly ten 200-yard dash men competing for the four places on the squad. The final winners were Beery, Kavanaugh, Williams and Irwin. The team, if weather conditions are favorable, is believed capable of approaching the Eastern Oregon record of 1:35, held jointly by Pendleton and La Grande teams of other years.

COMPLETE AZTEC CODEX IS ACQUIRED BY TULANE

NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP)—Tulane university authorities possess what they assert is the only complete Aztec codex in the United States.

The codex, now on exhibit in the university museum, is a long scroll of deerskin bearing painted figures of men and women.

Four hundred years ago the Aztecs nobles were told by their Spanish conquerors that those who could prove unblemished lineage for a certain number of generations would be exempt from taxation. Dr. Frans Blom, director of Tulane middle American research, said.

The Tulane codex is a record of one of the nobles seeking exemption in this way.

The bout, a ten-rounder, means everything to both fighters, for a chance at the championship of the world may be the victor's reward. But whatever is decided by the outcome, the customers were more than usually certain of completely satisfactory results. Neither knows anything but the socking method, and each has predicted knockout victory for himself.

Vital to Walker

LOS ANGELES, Apr. 29 (AP)—The applicant for sixteen world's free style swimming records, Miss Helene Madison of the Washington A. C., Seattle turned her attention to the 400-yard relay today as the national A. A. U. indoor championships moved into the second day.

This sturdy daughter of the Northwest looked back on yesterday's opening events with a slight nervous feeling, for she successfully defended her 1931 100-yard free style title only after the "closest call" she "can remember."

Miss Josephine McKim, petite Los Angeles athletic club navigator gave her the scare, finishing less than a foot behind with Miss Madison winning in 1 minute and 24 seconds.

"She was so close to me in the next lane," said Miss Madison, "that I didn't know there was anybody near. I looked around and there she was right at my shoulder, gosh it was thrilling and the closest call I can remember."

Miss Edna McKibben of the Washington A. C. finished third.

Miss Eleanor Holm, applicant for the world's 200-meter backstroke record, found little competition in the 300-yard medley race. The defending champion from the New York women's swimming association built up a huge lead in the breast stroke and backstroke laps to win by a good ten feet in 4 minutes 27.9 seconds.

The two Southern-Pacific A. A. U. women's championships were won by Clarence (Buster) Crabbe of the L. A. A. C. in the 1500-meter free style in 20 minutes 27.4 seconds; and Mickey Riley, also of the L. A. A. C., who piled up a good point margin to take the 10-foot spring board title.

The message assailed Chairman Stone of the farm board.

"Chairman Stone is quoted as refusing to sell wheat surplus to Americans for cash," it said, "but stating that our farmers' salvation lies in domestic markets."

"It appears inconsistent that he should refuse to sell wheat surplus to Americans for cash, but at the same time advocate practically gift of this surplus to foreign governments which countries are paying cash every day for their purchases of Argentine, Australian, Russian, Danubian and Canadian wheats."

PICKING JURY FOR TRIAL

PORTLAND, Ore., April 29 (AP)—With more than half of its members already seated tentatively, selection of a jury to try Mayor George L. Baker and three other Portland city officials on charges of malfeasance and negligence in office was expected to be completed today.

Standing trial with Baker are two city commissioners, John M. Mann and Earl Riley, and the city engineer, Cliff Laurgaard, and C. Lee Wilson, a contractor. Wilson was named as an alleged accessory in the malfeasance case.

Even prospective jurors were examined yesterday and none of them were challenged nor excused. Defense attorneys in questioning the prospective jurors asked them if they had signed recall petitions which have been circulated against Mayor Baker and if they belonged to any organizations advocating municipal ownership.

The malfeasance and negligence indictment against the city officials was based on the allegation that the city paid \$200,000 too much for a municipal market site on Front street. Wilson was president of the Public Market company which owned the site.
