MURRAY IS HELD LIKELY TO SHIFT TO SENATE RACE

Governor of Oklahoma, Who "Ran Out" on Oregon, Refuses to Make Statement Today.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Apr. 30 (AP)—Whether the political ambition of Gov. William H. Murray has shifted from the presidency to the United States senate will be learned today.

The filling period for state offices closes at 5 o'clock this afternoon and some political observers predict "Alfalfa Bill" will be a last minute entry.

Murray himself has refused to say whether he would be a candidate, after vigorously denying he planned to run several weeks ago.

The status of his presidential campaign also is in doubt since the abrupt cessation of his speaking tour in Oregon.

Impeachment Move Made
The governor asserted today impeachment charges had been prepared against him.

"I suspect you could see a copy in the attorney general's office," he said.

Attorney General J. Berry King said "The governor's charge, like his presidential campaign, strikes me as funny. The only thing I've heard about either is from him."

The governor's declaration threw some light on his motive for returning abruptly to the state from Oregon to seize the reins of government from Acting Governor Robert Burns, and his slipping across the state line to speak in Amarillo Thursday night.

HOP GROWERS SUPPORT WET CANDIDATES

SALEM, Apr. 29 (AP)—Candidates for United States senator and for congressman from the three Oregon districts were endorsed here by the Oregon Hop Growers association through its executive committee.

Consisting of the president and one delegate from each of the 10 locals of the association.

Two Republicans and two Democrats were given endorsement. They are:

United States senator—Robert N. Stanford, Republican.
Congressman, first district—James W. Mott, Republican.

Congressman, second district—Francis Galloway, Democrat.
Congressman, third district—General Charles H. Martin, Democrat.

Prefacing the endorsement the resolution adopted points out that the hop industry in Oregon embraces 15,000 acres of land in cultivation, an investment of \$3,000,000 paying taxes of \$100,000 annually, employing over 20,000 people annually and disbursing over \$1,800,000 in production expenditures, and sets out that enactment of the 18th amendment and the Volstead act has seriously curtailed our market for hops, with the accompanying low prices, and has caused the destruction of 11,000 acres in hops which has been planted in other crops in competition with other farm products.

Stating that "the hop industry is in grave danger of being destroyed, unless the 18th amendment is repealed or amended," the resolution goes on to state that the hop growers association will "support only such candidates for the United States senate and house of representatives who will support our effort to bring about the repeal of the 18th amendment and, or modification of the Volstead act."

Pinchot Deplores "Loss of Liberty" in United States

MOUNT VERNON, Va., Apr. 29 (AP)—Gov. Gifford Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, speaking at George Washington's tomb Thursday said Americans had lost the liberty gained by Washington, made sure by Lincoln and applied to modern problems by Roosevelt.

"But today there is no Washington to lead us against autocracy—against the suffering that goes with tyranny—against government without consent of the governed," he said. "There is no Lincoln to free modern slaves. There is no Roosevelt to warn us of the tyranny created by concentrated wealth—a concentration our government has the right and the means to stop, but which, instead, it has prompted by every means in its power."

Speaking before governors who attended the annual conference, he said there was nothing new to be said about Washington after 133 years of praise from a grateful people, and he struck vigorously at modern conditions he held to be antagonistic to Washington's ideals.

EUGENE MEYER IS OPPOSED TO PATMAN BILL

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—Eugene Meyer, governor of the federal reserve board, told the house ways and means committee Thursday that he had sufficient power under the law to increase the amount of currency and credit to meet business demands.

He voiced strenuous opposition to the Patman bill to inflate the currency by two billion dollars to pay the remainder outstanding on the soldiers' bonus.

Meyer testified that the world's gold supply is larger in comparison with the volume of business than at any time in history.

"The best thing congress can do to restore confidence which will restore business is to clearly indicate that it will not tinker with the currency," Meyer declared.

Meyer said, in reply to questions, that the reserve system has not yet employed the Glass-Steagall act to the extent of issuing currency on government bonds.

He estimated a billion dollars were being hoarded and said the banking structure should be unified under one chartering, regulatory and supervisory power, eliminating state control.

In the disturbance at Fourth and Federal streets clothing was torn, hats lost, and a few marchers were struck by clubs. Banners and placards were seized.

Traffic police near city hall quickly cleared the north plaza of a thousand or more persons, many of whom apparently were by-standers.

6000 SOCIALISTS IN N. Y.
NEW YORK, April 30 (AP)—With police on guard to prevent any interference by communists, 6000 Socialists and trade unionists assembled at Union Square today to celebrate May day.

"In honor of international holiday," Police said it was the largest demonstration of its kind since the World war.

Before assembling at Union Square the demonstrators paraded through the streets of the East side, escorted by mounted policemen.

Although a group of several hundred communists joined the meeting, they gave no police no cause for trouble. The communists shouted in unison:

"Down with socialists."
Across the top of the speakers' stand was a banner on which was printed:

"Free Tom Mooney."
RIMOUS AT VANCOUVER
VANCOUVER, B. C., April 30 (AP)—Police today gave little credence to reports a party of men described as communist sympathizers and unemployed, were marching to Vancouver from Aslerick and surrounding districts, carrying large quantities of explosives.

Authorities had heard the men raided a powder magazine at Ashcroft taking 1000 pounds of dynamite, but reports from there today said about 90 unemployed from lumber camps in that district had seized part of a 50 pound box of stumping powder, perhaps not more than 20 pounds.

However, trains moving toward here were being checked, and highway traffic scrutinized at strategic points enroute to Vancouver.
