

400 Attend Washington Inaugural Ball

Masons And Auxiliary Members Attend Ceremony Presented In Pageant Form Saturday Night

Four hundred Masons and members of auxiliary bodies attended the George Washington Inaugural ball, given here Saturday night in honor of the inauguration of the first president of the United States on the occasion of the bi-centennial celebration of his birth. The inaugural ceremony was presented in pageant form, after which dancing and cards were enjoyed in the ballroom and the parlors.

The ceremony took place in the Federal hall, and the Saturday evening's setting resembled the hall in which the senate and the houses of representatives were seated in joint session, waiting to receive the first president. There in the presence of many citizens and surrounded by friends, Alexander Hamilton, Roger Sherman, General Knox and St. Clair, Baron Steuben and others, George Washington, portrayed by George Birnie, took the oath of office administered by the chancellor of the state of New York, Robert Livingston, represented by Judge J. W. Knowles. Bowing, Washington kissed the Bible which was held by C. M. Humphrys. The military escort which accompanied the great man to the ceremony was the drill squad from the Eastern Oregon Commandery, No. 6, Knights Templar, dressed in trim blue uniforms, with plumes waving. O. B. Maxam, dujour, announced the arrival of the president.

"The Minuet" which was in vogue during the Colonial days in America, was danced by a group of 16 children, pupils of Central school, directed by Mrs. Mary Heasler and Mrs. A. J. Cook. They were dressed in Colonial costume, and each of the boys represented a celebrity of the day. Two record-breaking javelin throws. He broke the old record made by Gilliam of Baker, in 1920, during the morning preliminaries and then hurled the spear 178 feet 9 inches to break his own record in the afternoon. The conditions were ideal, with no trace of wind, a smooth, hard track and fairly warm weather. While, incidentally, is a southerner.
His other triumphs were in the high and broad jumps and the high hurdles, and he had a chance to win the low hurdles but stumbled, lost his stride, and could do no better than come in behind Graham, of Ontario, in 27.5 seconds.
Other Record Attempts Fall
Torrence tried for a record in the high jump and Baker, of Ontario, sought to set a new mark in the discus, but both failed.
In points scored, the La Grande team set a new meet record with 88. Second was Ontario with 30½, Union was third with 29½ and Pendleton fourth with 27. Imbler scored 17, Vale and Nyssa 7 each, Cove 4 and Vale 2. Umatilla and Adams failed to score.
Beery Wins Twice
There were three double winners in the meet. Beery, of La Grande, took the century and furlong, but he barely nosed out Woodell, of Imbler, in the opening event, which went in 10.5. He coasted home in the 220-yard dash in 23 flat, five yards ahead of Woodell, with Graham a close third.
Beery also carried the stick home in the relay event, which La Grande won by 25 yards in 1:36.2 seconds. Other members of the team were Kavanagh, Irwin and Williams.
Baker, of Ontario, took the discus and shotput and Warren, of Pendleton, breasted the tape first in both the 880 and mile runs.
Branwell, of La Grande, vaulted 10 feet 9 inches to outclass his competition in the pole vault, and Conklin, of Imbler, fished home in the mile in 6:01.8.
