

# Hope To Have Public Market By First Of June

## TRUCK, PRODUCE GROWERS MEET WITH COMMITTEE

### Second Meeting Scheduled For May 9—New Board of Officers to be Elected at Session.

Truck and produce growers met with the marketing committee on Monday evening, May 2 and completed arrangements for the opening of a public market, which they hope to have in shape to start about the first of June or first of July, depending on when an adequate supply will be available.

Kenneth Brown was appointed to contact other growers this week and report again at a meeting to be held on Monday evening, May 9. A new board of officers will be elected at

the coming meeting and final arrangements made for the opening. The committee hopes that every producer will co-operate in this work to assist in building up a market for local products and it is hoped that whether or not they are able to get in touch with Mr. Brown before the meeting that all interested be present. The May 9 meeting will begin at 7:30 in the civil service room of the post office building.

## Standard Cubes Up One Cent In Butter Market

PORTLAND, May 3 (AP)—Advance of 1c in the price of standard butter indicates not only the general feeling in the market, but the fact that consumers themselves are not contenting themselves with the lower grades. Standard cubes were lifted to 19c or the same price as so-called extras during the late season of the Portland produce exchange. The price of print butter is automatically advanced the same sum as a result.

Recent strength in the butterfat market and the payment of occasional premium of 1c lb. by some interest indicated the improving undertone of the general market for butter. Make continues to show increase with practically all churning capacity of the city in operation.

Egg market situation continues much the same as during recent days. There was no change in the price list of either private or co-operative marketers. Receipts continue to show fractional decrease.

Very slow trading tone is reflected

in the market for live chickens. Prices offered by buyers are almost generally the low marks with no keenness in the demand.

Trade in the market for country killed meats is marking time with practically no change in values. Veal is slow as are hogs and lambs. Receipts of the latter are extremely liberal.

Unusual drag is reflected in the demand for hothouse tomatoes. While quoted prices are unchanged, sales are being made lower in many instances in order to force a movement.

There are practically no change in general prices on California strawberries for the day; bulk of the good stuff moving \$1.50 @ \$1.60 for 20c. Quality of the Florin-Sacramento stock appears much the best.

Prices are steady to a trifle lower in the market for asparagus. Efforts of the trade to hold up values to conform to cash purchases at Columbia river sources appear futile. Local offerings are increasing.

Columbia river spring chinook salmon is being offered and is selling around 13c for dressed stock. Dressed shad are around 5c lb. Hallibut is 8c for chicken and 10c for medium. Crabs are scarce again.

Notes of wholesale trading: Mexican peppers are cheaper; down to 15c lb. generally. New potatoes are unchanged.

New onions are lower with more arriving. Further advances in oranges are shown in the south; stronger here. Old potatoes continue a slow but steady movement.

Rhubarb market appears fairly steady.

Quotations continue largely nominal on all grades of greasy wools and some further slight easing in ideas of values has been noted.

## Baltimore's Blue Laws Are Repealed

BALTIMORE BLUE local page BALTIMORE, May 3 (AP)—Baltimore can go to its moving picture shows, buy a loaf of bread or go to a baseball game really next Sunday for the first time in history.

By the most overwhelming vote ever registered on a question, the voters yesterday repealed the state's 200-year-old blue laws, insofar as they applied to the city, in a special election which overshadowed the presidential primary between President Hoover and former Senator Joseph P. France.

Baltimoreans cast 142,000 votes on the question, and passed the repeal by a majority of 83,990.

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—A bit of verse featuring beer was read in the senate today at the instance of Senator Bingham, Republican, Connecticut.

When the clerk finished reading, Senator Ribison, Democrat, Arkansas, inquired "Who called that poetry?" Senator Frazier, Republican, North Dakota, said that when he yielded the floor for the reading he "didn't know it was that kind of a poem."

## IOWA'S NEW GRID MENTOR TO TEST SPEARS, BIERMAN

IOWA CITY, Ia. (AP)—The University of Iowa, one of three Big Ten schools having new football coaches for 1932, will meet each of the others on the gridiron next fall.

Ossie Solem, new Iowa coach, will send his Hawkeyes against Wisconsin at Madison October 8. Wisconsin is now coached by Dr. Clarence W. Spears, whose strong Minnesota teams of 1928 and 1929 were upset by Iowa eleven, 7 to 6 and 9 to 7.

Minnesota with Bernie Bierman as new catch, will be the Hawks' homecoming opponent October 22. Solem himself was a Minnesota star of pre-war days, as was Bierman.

## MUCH OF LIST IN RETREAT IN WALL STREET

NEW YORK, May 3 (AP)—While oils and some of the leading industrial stocks managed to hold the line on today's stock market, much of the list was still in retreat. There were numerous losses of 1 to 3 points at the finish, and the closing tone was heavy. The turnover was again less than 1,000,000 shares.

Weakness of the dollar in the foreign exchange markets, apparently reflecting fears abroad of inflation here as result of passage of the Goldborough bill by the house, and heaviness of some of the principal commodities, were unsettling factors. Nevertheless, selling was meagre in the aggregate.

U. S. Steel and American Telephone lost only minor fractions, but issues off 2 to 3 points, included American Can, Western Union, Safeway Stores, J. C. Penney, U. S. Steel preferred, Allied Chemical, Coca Cola and others.

Turning then to the secretary, the Texan assailed the section of the bill which allows 18 months for revaluation of estates left between Sept. 1, 1928 and Jan. 1, 1932, to allow for depreciation in value due to the period of economic stress.

"When this bill was pending before the committee it was not suggested that the date set in the retroactive provision would permit the revaluation of Mr. Mills father's estate," Patman said.

Members of the committee objected immediately to Patman's testimony. "Several witnesses urged that provision," Acting Chairman Crisp said. "Secretary Mills said he did not care to comment because he would be a beneficiary."

"When on the floor I found that 30,000 estates would be affected by this provision, I voted to strike it out of the bill."

## CAPONE FURIOUS AS LAST HOPE OF FREEDOM FADDES

The appellate court vacated its writ after it had received a certified copy of the United States supreme court's decision yesterday refusing to review Capone's case.

A mitimus ordering Capone to prison was then made out and it was expected that he would be started for Leavenworth, Kan., within 24 hours.

Marshal H. C. W. Leubenhimer kept his plans for the prison trip secret, saying he wanted no crowds or interference.

Capone, giving up hope at last, packed his belongings soon after arriving at the county jail.

The gang leader has been in jail since Oct. 24 when Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson sentenced him to 11 years, fined him \$50,000 and refused to grant him bail. The time Capone has spent in jail does not apply on his prison term.

Marshal Leubenhimer had 17 other federal prisoners to be taken to Leavenworth and he said Capone would receive the same treatment en route as the other men.

Capone's mother was with him when the news came from Washington. He refused to see newspaper men, but jail attaches said he was furious.

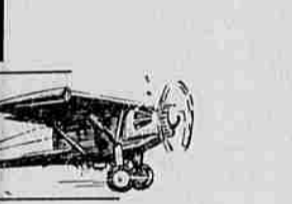
