With 65 schools and 483 athletes entered in the Oregon state high school track and field meet to be held Saturday at Corvallis, Eastern Oregon is furnishing 43 runners and field men, representing eight schools.

Indians' Winning Streak Broken By Browns, 11-8

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who have had neither pitching nor hitting to speak of since they completed their course in calisthenics this spring, at last show symptoms of recovering their batting eyes.

The latent power in the bats of the Flatbush Philadephians burst forth all of a sudden yesterday against the Giants. Brooklyn fell on McGraw's curves for enough runs to win, 11 to 7, and leave the Giants in complete possession of the National League cellar.

The Boston Braves and Chicago Cubs maintained their fight for first place in the senior league, the Braves clinging to their one-game advantage by beating the Phillies, 9 to 4, while the Cubs were coming from behind to trim the Pirates, 8 to 6.

"Dimzy" Dean, the Cardinals' much publicized rookie, finally came through with a shut-out victory over the Cincinnati Reds, 9 to 0. In winning their last three games, Hallahan, Johnson and Dean have granted the opposition just two runs.

Although three Washington pitchers issued sixteen passes, only two shy of the major league record, the Senators staggered through to a 5 to 4 win over the Yankees. It was the leaders' third straight over the Yanks and their sixth in a row.

Cleveland Beaten
Cleveland's winning streak was snapped at nine straight when the St. Louis Browns outslugged the Indians, 11 to 8.

George Earnshaw was in rare form, yielding only four hits as the Athletics won another from the Boston Red Sox, 6 to 1. The A's pecked away at Danny MacFadden for three runs in the first eight innings and then fell on Pete Donohue for three more in the ninth. Al Simmons knocked in three runs with a home run and a single.

Detroit and Chicago were rained out.

The hair-raiser of the evening was the semi-wind up which saw "Wildcat" Carter, Seattle, junior welterweight, technically knock out Eddie Volk, Portland, in the third round of a terrific battle. Volk walked away with the first round, but in the second the Wildcat came to life and from that time on it was anybody's fight. In the third round the boys battled so fiercely first one was out on his feet, then the other, but the Wildcat got home the blow that counted. By unanimous vote of the huge crowd, Promoter Joe Waterman agreed to rematch them.

In a hard six round battle, Johnny Spencer, 143 pounds, Seattle, took a decision over Teddy Fox, 142, Salem. They slugged toe to toe.

HUSKIES TOP LEAGUE; WIN TWO IN IDAHO

MOSCOW, Ida., May 4 (AP)—At least until this afternoon, the University of Washington baseball team tops the northern division conference, getting there by taking two straight games from the University of Idaho.

The Huskies took Idaho's number 6 to 2 yesterday, and won 14 to 3 Monday. Adding these two victories to one over Washington State at Pullman Friday, Washington has three victories and one defeat. Washington State has two victories and a defeat.

Washington State plays Oregon State at Corvallis this afternoon and a victory here would throw the Cougars into a tie with Washington. Idaho has lost three straight.

Helen Picks U. S. To Win Davis Cup

CHEERBOURG, France, May 4 (AP)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody landed today from the Ile De France with the prediction the United States would win the Davis cup this year unless Rene La Coete returned to the French team with much of his old time wizardry. Mrs. Moody is here to play in the French hard court championships before proceeding to Wimbledon for the Wightman cup matches and the Wimbledon tournament.

Uncle Sam found a place on his 1928 Olympic track team for Bernard (Barney) Berlinger, and he'll probably make room for the big Pennsylvanian again this summer at Los Angeles. Berlinger is this country's outstanding hope for decathlon honors. Berlinger graduated from Pennsylvania last June and is now engaged in the manufacturing business with his father. Last year as captain of the Penn track team he scored 10 points in the I. C. 4A indoor games, won the Illinois Relays pentathlon, the Norwegian pentathlon and the Penn Relays decathlon championships and scored nine points in the intercollegiate outdoor games.

SEALS CONTINUE TO BUILD MARGIN

Frisco Wins From Stars 7 to 5 While Beavers Noseout Seattle.

The baseball series of the North Pacific coast, featuring Seattle's Indians and the Portland Ducks, was swinging in favor of the Oregon team today.

Portland took the series opener yesterday 3-2 in a pitching duel between William Dietrich, speed balling, and Jack Walters, slow ball specialist. The Indians tied the score at two all with a ninth inning rally but the Ducks slipped over the winning run in their turn at bat the last half.

Oakland took the series opener from Sacramento 5-3 in the first night game of the 1932 season at Sacramento. Pitcher Pete Duglia made an Oakland victory possible in the seventh when his double scored two runs.

Seals Down Stars
San Francisco's Seals went right ahead with their winning streak and downed Hollywood 7-5. The Seals grabbed an early lead and Bill Henderson, who pitched for them, held the Stars in check until the closing rounds. He also added his victory by a double and two singles and scored two runs. Hunt for the Seals, and Brannan of Hollywood, got homers.

The Mission Reds, strengthened by two new players, ended a losing streak and punched out 11 hits to defeat Los Angeles 6-4 last night. The new additions to the Mission team are Mark Keene, formerly of Detroit, playing third, and Roy Frazier, purchased from the Seals, playing in the outfield.

Whitney Horse May Make Race At Louisville

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 4 (AP)—A Whitney horse may win the Kentucky derby after all, in the opinion of scores of railbirds who thronged Churchill Downs to watch the first gallops by Stephenfitch and Overtime. Mrs. John Hay Whitney's eligibles for Saturday's \$50,000 classic.

Withdrawal of C. V. Whitney's crack filly Top Flight and Mrs. Payne Whitney's Curacao from the derby field left Mrs. John Hay Whitney the only member of that prominent turf family to have representation in the historic race.

Stephenfitch will be ridden in the derby by the veteran jockey, L. Ensom. Earle Sande himself, who has had mounts on three derby winners, will ride Overtime in his attempt to make his recent turf comeback decisive.

Sande to Ride Overtime
Should Sande win on Overtime, he would be the first jockey in history to ride four derby winners. He and Isaac Murphy now share the record at three each. Sande has won on Zev, Flying Ebony and Gallant Fox.

Mrs. L. G. Kaufman's Tick On is the pre-derby favorite and the leading eastern candidate. Col. E. R. Bradley's entry of Brother Joe and Burgo King bear the hopes of the west. Thomas M. Cassidy's Universe, winner of the Wood Memorial, is another, highly favored eastern candidate along with the Whitney pair.

Knebelkamp and Morris, Adobe Post became a certain starter when he recorded a surprise victory over ten other western derby nominees in the preparation race at the downs yesterday. The later Joseph Leiter's Prince Hotspur was second and J. W. Parrish's Cold Check third.

Filly May Start
There is slight chance for a filly starting in this year's derby, now that Top Flight is definitely out. Mr. Parrish has a filly eligible, Depression, which is entered in a race at the downs today. Even should Depression win today, Mr. Parrish said she will not start unless Cold Check breaks down in the next three days. No other filly in the list of nominations is considered of derby calibre.

Disappointment was expressed in local racing circles when Mrs. Graham Fair Vanderbilt decided not to send Sweeping Light to the derby.

There was a sentimental attachment to Sweeping Light hereabouts because he developed from a weanling into a winning juvenile last year after recovering from blood poisoning. Mrs. Vanderbilt, however, did not believe he would be a contender in the derby.

Sport Slants

Lawson Robertson seems to be in excellent voice for another Olympiad. Man and boy, athlete and coach, Mr. Robertson has seen these events come and go for a quarter-century.

He ran the sprints in Athens, learned to speak three French phrases fluently in Paris and resorted to sherry and cognac to inspire America's only flat-race winner in the games at Amsterdam.

Not only is he a man of seasoning and experience, but he comes naturally by an Irish sense of humor. When he took the floor, therefore, at the meeting of the American Physical Education association, he was prepared to dwell upon the origin of the Olympics in Ireland 3000 years ago, at a time when the leading broad-jumper hopped across Ireland in three jumps and a javelin tosser, after one-mighty heave, leaped on horseback to pursue and grab the spear before it came to earth.

"Tipperary finally won the meet," concluded Robbie, "but the North of Ireland is still claiming the championship."

Robbie REMEMBERS
Turn now to the modern Olympics with Mr. Robertson, his throaty baritone well conditioned, his imagination keen and his words fluent. To Mr. Edward J. Storey, secretary of the A. P. E. A., I am indebted for the following abstract:

"At Athens in 1906... Mr. Robertson examined the old discs, a relic of former Olympic games, and found it to weigh 14 pounds. The inscribed record of the old days gave 90 feet as the distance. There is necessarily some question as to this since the official discs now

weigh only 4 1/2 pounds. "The next Olympics were held in London in 1908 and were characterized by the advent of the first cheering section. A feature of the 1912 Olympics at Stockholm was the reception of the American team at the dock, where a group of Swedes were led by a former American-trained coach in singing 'My Country 'Tis of Thee.'"

SINGLE LAPSE
"In 1920 the scene changed to Antwerp. Sportmanship had gained and except for an occasion where a United States boxer resented a judge's decision and socked him on the jaw, closely followed by the sock of the coach to the referee's mid-section, the games were a big success. In 1924 the Frenchmen were hosts at Paris. A good time was had by all. Of course in all these years America has been winning by very wide margins. Sportmanship is easy when you are ahead."

"The next Olympics were held in 1928 at Amsterdam. Our athletes had the idea all they had to do was to get up in the morning, get a hair cut and shave and win first, second and third places in all events. Contrary to all expectations we only won one running event, the 400 meters, which was taken by Ray Barbati of Syracuse."

"Noticeably the sportmanship of all nations had improved and an outstanding event was the 800 meters in which Engelhardt of Germany pushed Lowe of England to

a new Olympic record, after which they ran off the field arm in arm. This was only ten years after the war."

"The 1932 Olympics will be held at Los Angeles and most everyone is familiar with the many things that are being done in preparation. The only specific diet advised for the athletes is running water for the runners and spring water for the jumpers."

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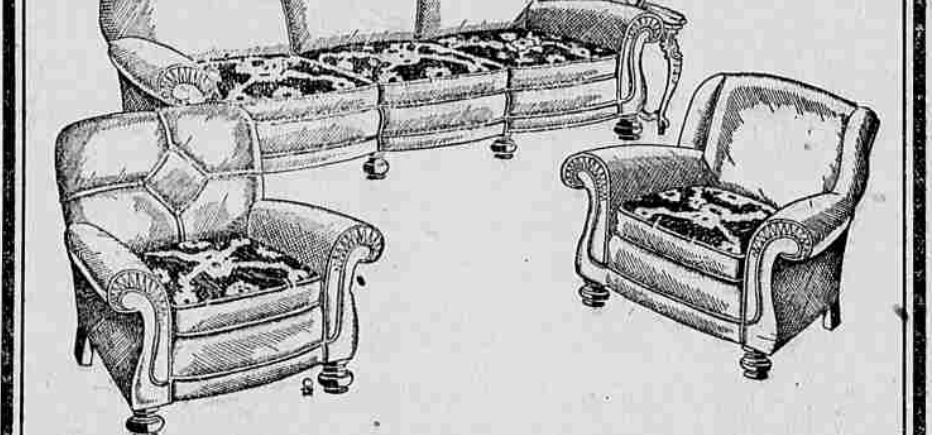
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
