Chats With Parents

GROWN UP TALK
By Alice Johnson Peale

Two boys aged 7 and 9 are permitted to listen in on the unlicensed conversation of their parents and their friends.

Evening after evening they sit absorbing information on such varied subjects as the war in China, Mabel's divorce with complicated and detailed reasons, the depression, the latest lurid murder with probable psychological explanations, a recent review with examples of its funniest jokes.

Some of this talk is thoughtful and clever but most of it is merely is bright and a little bitter.

Much the children do not understand and much would bore them if the voices and the manner of the talkers did not betray their certain world. He has not the background of experience with which to assimilate them. They only worry and confuse him and give him false ideas.

Perhaps this sort of thing does not sink deeply enough to do real harm unless the family circle is not a happy one.

Yet it is in precisely the home where there is none too much serenity and affection that there is most likely to be much of the type of conversation described.

Health

THE HEART AS A DYNAMO
The Journal of the American Medical association in a recent issue discussed the heart as an electrical generator and showed that the power of the human heart as a pump and as a working organ is most impressive.

The combined efforts of the hearts of the inhabitants of the United States approximate 70,000 horse power, delivering daily the energy equivalent of the flow of the Niagara river.

Despite this large energy output, the human heart is not very efficient as a dynamo.

It has been estimated that if the

electrical energy produced by the heart in its contractions were used for lighting purposes, it would require 1000 years to accumulate enough electrical energy to light up a small flashlight bulb for one second.

Despite the infinitesimally minute amount of electrical energy produced by the heart in its contractions, it has been possible since 1903 to use this electrical energy in diagnosis.

In 1903 Einthoven introduced the string galvanometer. Since his time the electro-cardiograph has been developed and perfected.

By means of the modern electrocardiograph, the electricity generated by the contracting heart can be observed and recorded, and this enables us to make more competent diagnoses and prognoses of heart disease.

With the great advance in electrical research and the practical development of the amplifying systems used in radio, it is now possible to step up or to amplify greatly the original electricity generated by the heart in its contractions.

This much amplified picture enables us to study the heart's functions in a way comparable to that in which a microscope enables us to see minute and otherwise invisible bodies.

By means of these enlarged pictures or graphs, we may gather added information on the function of this essential organ.
