The entire faculty of the Training school, assisted by the student teachers, directed the prologue and planned and made costumes.

The costumes were Grecian with the exception of Pluto, king of the underworld, who was dressed in a dark red robe with a golden crown on his head. Hermes, the messenger, was dressed according to the Greek custom, with silver wings on his heels.

The story of "Demeter and Persephone" is the Greek story explaining the change of the seasons. Effects were cleverly carried out in the Training school production by a gradual dimming of the stage lights.

Mildred Green played the role of Persephone; Demeter, her mother, was portrayed by Winnifred Scott; Dallas Marshall, Pluto; Hermes, the messenger, Howard Beck. Dancing girls, who carried flowers, and who sang assisted by the chorus, were Verna Ward, Patricia Hall, Betty Burns, Jean Buchanan, Betty Jo Crabtree and Griselda Buey. The entire prologue was the story of Persephone told in poetry and set to music that gave the mood of the poem.
