

# La Grande Team Leaves For Corvallis

## CARLOAD LEAVES AFTER ASSEMBLY AT HIGH SCHOOL

Sport Writers Picking La Grande, Grant, Jefferson and Washington as First Four.

Following a rousing pep assembly held at the high school auditorium this morning the first carload of La Grande High track and field athletes, accompanied by Coach Ira Woodie, left about 10 o'clock this morning for the state meet at Corvallis. A second carload, including Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Orsapp, was to leave after school this afternoon, and a third group of six boys was to board the train tonight. All were to be in Corvallis by tomorrow afternoon, and the first carload expected to spend tonight in Portland.

Limited to Three Events. The list as given above will of necessity be altered greatly. To begin with, Torrence can enter only three events. In all probability, he will compete in the high and broad jumps and the javelin. That will leave Walker and Hannafield in the high hurdles and DeBole and Walker in the low hurdles.

Kavanaugh probably will not start in the quarter mile, in which event La Grande will be represented in this event. This depends upon whether Kavanaugh qualifies in the century or furlong heats in the morning of course. If he doesn't qualify he may start the 440.

Beery, in the event that he fails to qualify in the 100-yard dash probably will replace Burnett in the broad jump. If Beery does qualify in the century, he will not broad jump.

The rule is simply this: a man may be entered in either one track and two field events, two track and one

field events, or three field events, plus the relay. And a coach may enter four men in any one event, but only two (excepting the relay) may compete.

Indications are that the final lineup will look about like this: 100-yard dash: Beery, Kavanaugh, 220-yard dash: Beery, probably Williams.

Braves Flatten Phillies. In their parting shot at sectional neighbors yesterday, the Braves flattened the Phillies, 3 to 0. Rick Betts, the veteran "rookie," turned in his third consecutive victory as he held the slugging Phils to four hits.

The Cardinals moved up into the first division with their second straight shut-out over Cincinnati, 7 to 0. Phil Rizzuto became the fourth Card hurler to pitch brilliant ball in as many days when he limited the Reds to six hits, three of them by George Graubauer.

The youngsters, Lonnie Warnecke, recorded his fourth victory as the Chicago Cubs defeated Pittsburgh, 4 to 1. He scattered six hits and received noble support, while the Pirate defense cracked at crucial moments behind Larry French.
