

Mother's Day To Be Observed Over The Nation Sunday, May 8

Several Local Churches Will Honor Mothers

Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist and Christian Churches Announce Plans For Observance.

May 8, the one day specially set aside in reverence of the mothers of the nation, will find many of the La Grande churches planning special services for the day. Rev. W. H. Hertzog, pastor of the Methodist church, announces that a special service dealing with the motherhood of the nation will be delivered. The Presbyterian church has planned, not only a mother's day sermon, but also special music for the event. The Baptist and Christian churches are also among the religious institutions observing the national event.

The young people of the Zion English Lutheran church have interesting plans for Sunday evening, when they will go to Baker to be the guests of the Baker Luther league, at a devotional and social meeting.

First Methodist Episcopal Church, Fourth at Spring Street. "Significant Motherhood" is the theme of the sermon which Rev. W. H. Hertzog, announced for the Sunday morning service at the Methodist Episcopal church, at 11 o'clock. The service is planned in honor of Mother's day, and a significant feature of the event will be the baritone solo, "Love Your Mother," by Avis, by Paul Knauts.

Zion English Lutheran Church, M Avenue near Fourth. The Luther league of the Zion Lutheran church has planned to go

to Baker to be the guests of the Baker league at a devotional and social meeting Sunday evening. They will leave by car Sunday afternoon and a large group is expected to go. Rev. Edwin W. Bracher believes.

Mr. Bracher will climax a day of interesting activity, beginning with Sunday school at 9:45, when the study will be devoted to the story: "A Slaveboy Who Lived the Story of Jesus."

Special music will be sung by the choir, and the young people's meeting will be "Appreciating Our Parents," leader, Grace Hedden. The subject for the evening sermon will be "God's Call." "Because I live, ye shall live also" —John 14:19.

Since our Lord rose from the dead, we have no hesitation in accepting the fact that we, too, shall rise. I wonder if something of our difficulty doesn't grow out of our disposition to think that the soul is something that has been, or is to be, added to our constitution. But that is a reversed thought. The fact is that the "soul is form and doth pervade our matter"; that "added" is not the soul, it is the body. Think of man as having a body, pretty much as you would think of him as having a coat of a house, and you have the right thought. The body can be and is himself outside his house and apart from his coat, so when death comes and puts him "outside" his body, he is the same man in all respects. The body was only an essential part of him. He only possessed it for a time.

Keep thoroughly in mind the fact that when we go there we do preserve our identity and are most truly "ourselves," for the simple reason that in going "there" we go. All that is properly our own must go with us, and surely no one thing can be more ours than our identity. One continues to have all that is himself. The friend, man or woman, is still the same loving and loving person, awaiting the reuniting conditions much beloved. When you meet and have "in that day" will be more real than anything you have known or experienced—as truly real as human as any life can be or has ever been.

Services Held For Mr. Searle At M. E. Church

WALLOWA, Ore., May 6 (Special)—E. A. Searle, a well-known farmer and school clerk, was buried here Thursday afternoon. He committed suicide at his home Tuesday afternoon.

Services were held in the Methodist church with Rev. E. Pollock officiating. Standley lodge, A. F. and M. E. of which he was a member, conducted the services at the cemetery and the Eastern Star lodge, of which he also was a member, followed in a body.

Elihu Ashel Searle was born March 9, 1879 in North Platte, Neb., according to the obituary notice. He was 53 years, one month and 25 days of age at the time of his death.

At the age of six years he lost both parents, thereafter making his home with his uncle, E. Searle, of Ojala, Neb. After finishing high school he took a business course at Omaha. He worked for the Union Pacific for many years at various points in the state, and city treasurer positions of trust which he very capably filled and where his opinion was highly valued.

In 1907 he married Rachel E. Harris and to this union twin girls were born in 1914, girls of whom any father could well be proud.

He leaves to mourn his loss his widow, Rachel E. Searle, two daughters, Miriam and Maxine; a sister, Mrs. L. E. Woods, of Spokane, and several nieces and nephews besides countless friends. For E. A. Searle was the friend of everyone.

He has been a life-long member of the Episcopal church and lived a consistent Christian life. At the age of 21 he became a member of both the Masonic and Eastern Star lodges. He also was a member of the Boy Scout troop committee here in Wallowa.
