

Butterfat Fight Causes Worry In Some Districts

PORTLAND, May 6 (AP)—Fight in the butterfat market forced recently by Portland centralizers has created much apprehension not only among the country creameries affected, but by some of the city plants. With the Portland delivery price lower, to the same as that quoted for payment at country stations, the situation here appears to reflect the usual fighting spirit.

While the center of the fight at the moment appears in the Central Oregon region, where two centralizers are waging war against a co-operative concern, there is some fighting reported in other sections.

Butter Market Steady Market for butter continues to re-

flect full steadiness in the local territory despite the increasing make in both city and country plants. Prices were unchanged for the day. Situation in the egg market is strengthening somewhat with more general forecasts for an early upward price revision. The only thing holding back the price at the moment appears the underselling by unattached producers who quote low figures to retailers.

Prices in the chicken market are much of a mystery. For instance killers are paying as much for fowls as Chisholms and paying the expense to Portland which keeps the local price low. This has the effect of stopping home receipts and injuring the home buyer.

Lower prices are being named for country killed spring lamb with a general top of 13c lb. now in effect. This is the lowest known for top quality offerings in the local trade.

General extreme for country killed calves has been cut to 7 1/2 c lb. along

MARKET RALLY OCCURS TODAY IN EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, May 6 (AP)—A rousing rally in the stock market today greeted a batch of encouraging news items from Washington. Gains of \$3 to \$5 a share were numerous among the pivotal issues as Wall Street learned that the senate finance committee had agreed on a tax bill which would be acceptable to the administration and as word came from the house that a means committee of its intention to report unfavorably on legislation for a cash payment of the veterans' bonus.

The rally was well under way when United States Corp. announced a 10 percent wage and salary reduction, to be effective May 15, but receipt of this news, which will substantially reduce the big company's operating costs, brought an increased demand and closing prices were around the day's highest. Total sales were about 1,500,000 shares.

NEW BUSINESS INCREASES IN LUMBER TRADE

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6 (AP)—Fifty-six of the 122 mills reporting to the Western Pine association operated at 38.8 per cent of capacity during the week ending April 30, the association announced today. During this period current new business increased 2.8 per cent, and unfilled orders and shipments increased although there was a decrease in current production. Production for the week amounted to 26,376,000 feet; shipments were 35,567,000 feet, and orders 36,672,000 feet. Unfilled orders increased 1,100,000 feet.

Current new business increased 932,000 feet over the preceding week, while current production decreased 820,000 feet, and shipments were off 177,000 feet.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, May 6 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin of Boston will say tomorrow: "Another dull week has been experienced in the wool trade. A little demand for woolen wools has been reported but there has been hardly anything being done in western wools. Prices are almost wholly nominal, in the absence of business, quotations being merely the best estimate of value possible. "In the piece goods markets, next to nothing is being done and at the mills more machinery has been closed down during the week. "In the west, the movement of the new clip continues slow. Mostly, the wools being moved are being taken on consignment against advances of from 6 to 8 cents, depending upon the wool. "Foreign markets have been dull and slightly in favor of the buyer. "Mohair is extremely dull in the seaboard markets. A little hair is reported to have been sold at about 9 cents for adult and around 25 cents for kid in Texas. 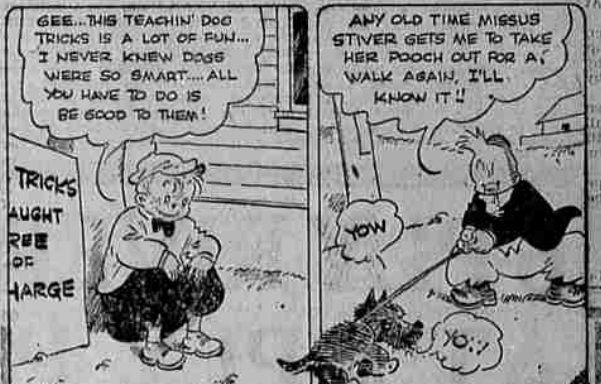
