

Ex-Crown Prince Supports Adolph Hitler

ACTION CAUSES GUESSING AS TO ULTIMATE RESULT

Some Believe Kaiser's Son Sees Democratic Germany as Only a Passing Matter.

BERLIN (AP) — With two of the Hohenzollern princes openly supporting Adolf Hitler, German politicians are wondering whether an "imperial" election might not mean restoration of the monarchy.

Even those Republican minded persons who are firm in their belief that Hitlerian will vanish in the quick sands of time, took notice when a statement came from Czar Nicholas II's son, "Friedrich Wilhelm, Crown Prince," instead of just plain "Ferdinand Hohenzollern." It revealed that Hitler was the presidential choice of the ex-hered to the throne.

The signature has been interpreted by many as indicating that the ex-kaiser's choice was "imperial" Democratic Germany as only a passing matter, and that his hopes are rising.

The anti-Hitlerites admit too that only the naive would argue that the prince has hitched his wagon to the wrong star.

Although Hitler has repeatedly asserted that his "third reich" would not mean another monarchy, such observers believe that once "in," Hitler easily could convince his followers, nourished on the Hohenzollern fairy of military trappings, drums and belching, that it was their solemn duty to restore the monarchy.

Home-making No Longer Held As Sentimental Art

Home-making no longer is considered sentimentally as an art. It is a business and a challenge to the modern woman.

Miss Margaret Coates one of the young western women who have made a thorough study of home economics and who now are helping other western women in solving difficult household problems, believes that all women should approach their household tasks scientifically.

Miss Coates comes to La Grande as a member of the Safeway home-makers' bureau lecturing staff, to conduct the Safeway three-day cooking school at the Sacajawea ballroom, beginning Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

This young home economist believes that much of the home-makers' time is wasted because of lack of planning. She contends: "Where women spend more time in planning they spend less time in actual work. Managing to save work means that the home-maker has to view herself as an efficiency expert and survey her job critically to see where time wastes may be cut, physical effort lessened and mental strain diminished."

One advises all home-makers to model their homes along successful business lines and segregate various tasks into departments with food heading the list.

"More than half the average woman's time is spent with food—in buying, preparing, eating and clearing-away — and this is coupled with the fact that practically all diseases come from nutritional sources should make every home-maker anxious to plan her home in such a way that important departments receive proper consideration," is the opinion expressed by Miss Coates.

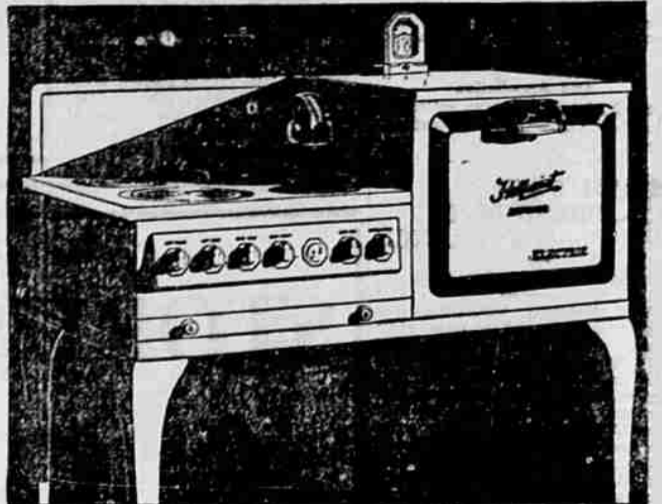
