Soil Survey Progressing—Of Oregon's 18 to 20 million acres of tillable land, approximately 8,000-

000 acres have now had the benefit of detailed soil surveys and descriptive maps and reports. Powers, head of the soils department at Oregon State college, making it possible for any farmer living in that vast area of some five million acres to find out exactly the type of soil on his place and how it may be best managed so far as experience has shown.

Sam figured that if he catered to the fairer sex, more wives would let their husbands attend the matches. Now his attendance has doubled, and one-third of his customers are women.

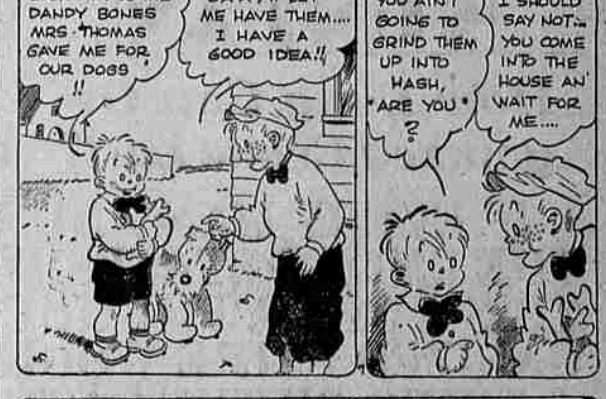
