

La Grande High Fourth In State Track Meet

TORRENCE AND BEERY BOTH IN FIRST POSITIONS

Sprinter Takes 220-yard Dash; Negro Ties For First In High Jump, Takes Second in Javelin.

La Grande High school's track team was back on its own stamping grounds today, perhaps a bit disappointed at not bringing home first or second place in the state meet at Corvallis Saturday, but nevertheless ranked as having the greatest track team in the state outside of Portland.

It was the large Portland schools that proved the Tigers' undoing, with Washington, Jefferson and Grant taking the first three places in the order given.

Terrace Finishes Fourth
As it was La Grande was fourth with 16.7 points, leading Salem in fifth place by 5.7 points. And Willie Terrace, who was expected to make a race for high point honors, accounted for 8 1/2 markers in spite of hard luck in the broad jump that resulted in the La Grande negro failing to qualify in this event. He won at Corvallis last spring.

Torrence tied for first in the high jump with Kidd, of Washington, and took second in the javelin.

Beery Wins Fourth
The major share of honors perhaps belongs to Corwyn Beery, although he did not make as many points as Torrence. Beery, however, outclass a field of best sprinters in the 220-yard dash to close his high school athletic career with first in the furlong in 23 flat. This after running fourth in the fastest high school 100-yard dash ever run in Oregon—won by Bobby Grayson of Jefferson High, in 9.9 seconds.

Beery also ran on the La Grande relay team consisting of Kavanagh, Erwin, Williams and Beery, which took fifth place in the time of 1:36.2.

Besides the 16 1/2 points chalked up by Torrence and Beery and the relay team, Bramwell went into a tie for fifth place in the pole vault, scoring for a fifth of a point. He and four others tied for this place.

Torrence took fourth high point mark, being out of Hart, of Beaverton. For this place by half a point.

This event completed the La Grande High school athletic competition for the 1931-32 year, giving the Tigers the following record:

Football—Runner-up with Baker to Enterprise, for Eastern Oregon championship, both at Pendleton. Baker losing to the Savages in a playoff.

Basketball—Runner-up to Baker for the district basketball championship.

Track—Eastern Oregon championship, winner of county meet and triangular meet at Pendleton. Second place in the state track and field meet at Corvallis.

Incidentally, only one other team that competed in the Eastern Oregon meet this year scored at Corvallis. Ontario's 1931 state discus champion took second place.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Hector Dyer, former Stanford university star sprinter, is going back 40 years to prove that Charles H. Sherrill of Yale was mistaken in introducing the crouching start.

The I. C. A. A. champion for the 220-yard dash in 1930, now participating with the Los Angeles Athletic club in preparation for the Olympic games, is reviving the standing start, cast into the discard during 1887 and 1889 when a 10 flat runner for the 100-yard dash was a star of the first ranking.

A leg injury which made a crouching start hazardous to Dyer has been largely responsible for the revolutionary change, although his coach, Boyd Comstock, whose success is written in the I. C. A. A. national championships of recent years, has been working on this theory for some time.

Fast "220"
Dyer caused considerable of a furor in track circles several weeks ago when he won a 220-yard dash in 21.8 seconds from a standing start.

"If you master the standing start," Dyer said later, "it has the crouching start beaten any number of ways."

Grimes Chalks Up Victory For Chicago Cubs

Burlingame Grimes, whose name is synonymous with baseball courage, is back in harness again and the Chicago Cubs, tough enough without him, are just that much more formidable.

An attack of influenza laid low the veteran right hander just as the 1932 season opened but he came back yesterday to survive a three-run attack by the Brooklyn Dodgers in the first inning and finally beat them, 12-5.

Max Carey's hopefuls, with Hack Wilson still out of the lineup, pounded Grimes for six hits and four runs in the first two innings. After that they amended the ancient adage for only six more safeties and could not score again until the ninth when the Cubs already had a 12-4 lead.

Dazzy Vance, usually extremely effective against the Cubs, had one man out in the third inning when he lost control, walked three men in a row and was unceremoniously yanked. Before the inning was over the Cubs had scored five times and taken a 7-4 lead.

This victory stretched Chicago's advantage in the National league to three full games as the Boston Braves lost their fourth straight to the Cincinnati Reds, 6-5.

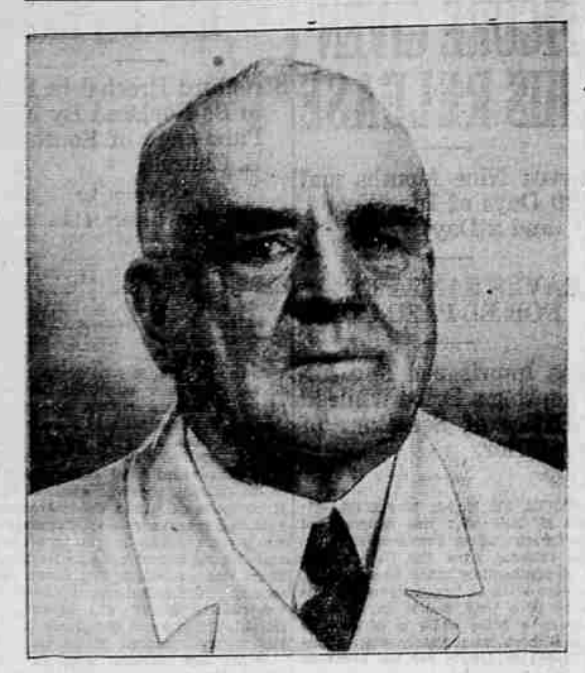
The New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals split a double bill. The Giants won the opener, 4-1, as Carl Hubbell allowed only six hits, the Cardinals the nightcap, 6-5, as the eccentric Dizzy Dean went the route for the champions.

The Washington Senators maintained their lead in the American league race by noosing out the Chicago White Sox, 6-5, in 14 innings. Moe Berg's single drove home the winning run much to the annoyance of Ted Lyons who traveled the full route for the White Sox. Walter Johnson called on four pitchers, Marberry, Burke, Fischer and Bagland in that order.

Cleveland walloped the Philadelphia Athletics again, 8-5, and the Boston Red Sox broke an eight game losing streak at the St. Louis Browns' expense, 7-5.

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 9 (AP)—Elimination meets to determine the schools to be represented at the annual state high school track and field meet, were recommended by coaches of schools which participated in the field day here Saturday in which Washington High school of Portland won the trophy.

Elimination meets would be similar to those preceding the annual basketball tournament at Salem. A committee of coaches was appointed to study a plan for dividing the state into districts for elimination purposes. This group will report to the state athletic association this fall.

CHICAGO, May 9 (AP)—Vice President Harry Grabner, of the White Sox, refuses to get excited over the University of San Francisco protest in the case of "Lefty" Peiber.

University officials threatened to file a protest with Baseball Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis under the rule discouraging the snatching of college players before graduation.

AUTO DRIVER HURT FATALLY IN SPEEDWAY

OAKLAND, Cal., May 9 (AP)—The name of Jimmie Sharp, of Los Angeles, one-time ranking automobile racer of the Pacific coast was added to the list of those who have died on the track today as a result of fatal injuries received in the 100-mile contest on the Oakland speedway yesterday.

Sharp's machine, in sixth place as it tore around the fifty-fourth lap, slid into the guard rail, hurtled 30 feet into the air and plunged down a 15-foot embankment. The driver received a fractured skull and internal injuries. He died a few hours later. It was his first appearance on a speedway since he was injured during a race at San Jose in 1930.

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
