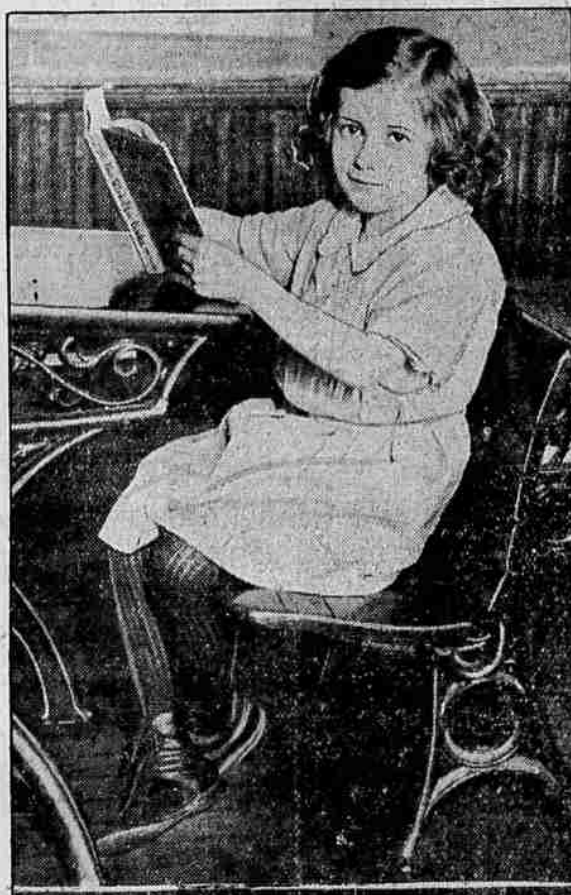
Visitor—

TAX LEAGUE IN IMPORTANT MEET

it more acceptable to other counties of the state.

SALEM, May 9 (AP)— More than one hundred members of the Oregon Taxpayers' Equalization and Conservation League were due here today to attend "probably the most important meeting ever held in the state, so far as the subject of taxation is concerned." The meeting, called by Leslie M. Scott as president, was characterized as such by Governor Julius L. Meier in the quoted terms.

The session will be the annual meeting of the state-wide organization. Governor Meier has prepared a long statement to present for consideration by the group, in which it is reported he will augment his demand for tax reduction by the proposal of legislation. A constitutional amendment to make supervision of taxation and bonded indebtedness incurred by local districts much more rigid, was reported among his recommendations. The governor's plan is believed to be a modification of the state supervision of taxes adopted in Indiana.

More Cuts Needed
In a statement released prior to the meeting the governor said further reduction of district, county and state taxes, and elimination of useless expenditure must be accomplished by the government in the forthcoming year. "The time has now come for the initiation of legislation which will vest control over local tax levies in some centralized authority. We have accomplished as much in tax reduction as we possibly can through voluntary effort." The governor pointed out that since the organization of the league a year ago, the tax levy of Oregon has been reduced 14.42 per cent. He said "the records show that the aggregate amount levied on the tax rolls of Oregon for 1932 is some \$42,979,000 as compared with \$50,223,000 for 1931, representing a reduction of approximately \$7,244,000." The meeting was expected to last all day, at the conclusion of which important recommendations will be drafted for consideration by the 1933 legislature.

CORVALLIS, May 9 (AP)— Spring lambs opened today steady to slightly lower on most markets reporting to the O. S. C. extension service and the U. S. D. A. bureau. Beginning today markets are reporting all old crop lambs as yearlings, with "lamb" meaning spring stuff exclusively.

A small lot of strictly choice lambs sold at \$6 at Portland although the bulk of sales was \$5.75 for good to near choice.

San Francisco was weak with top price \$5.25 for good to near choice California lambs. Chicago was steady with native stock at \$7.50 to \$8.00. At Omaha bids were down 25c to 50c with no sales reported at quotations of \$8.50 for better grade.

Charles Flint Missing From Shoreham Hotel

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)— Charles R. Flint, 83, familiarly known as "the father of trusts" because of his wide activities in organizing corporations, was sought by police here today after his wife reported him missing from their quarters at the Shoreham hotel.

Flint disappeared about 4:30 p. m. yesterday, his wife said, leaving in a taxicab presumably for Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore. Officials in that city, as well as in New York where he had extensive business interests, have been requested to aid in the search.

Retired Two Years Ago

The missing man retired from active work two years ago. His long years of business activity took him into many fields of endeavor. He was widely known as an expert on South American affairs and at different times had either private or governmental connections in Peru, Chile, Nicaragua, Costa Rica and Brazil.

Among the numerous organizations he had a part in planning were the American Woolen company, the United States Rubber company, Sloss Sheffield Steel and Iron company, the American Chicle company and the Computing Scales company.

Flint Attracted Considerable Attention in 1927 when he was almost 78 by his marriage to Charlotte Reeves, many years younger than he.

Danger of Revolt Seen by McGrady

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)— Edward P. McGrady, speaking for the American Federation of Labor, warned a senate committee today there is danger of revolt unless the federal government takes action to relieve unemployment.

Testifying to the manufacturers committee considering the Costigan relief bill, he said "if something is not done and starvation is going to continue and perhaps increase, the doors to revolution are going to be thrown wide open and leaders of the country ought to know it."

Fly Kills Worm

"The summary represented the best view we could obtain from the conflicting opinions. A majority agreed that if the amendment was revised it should be made to read that congress shall have power to regulate or prohibit the manufacture and transportation within the United States."

Wickersham said he felt the prohibition investigation and report had overshadowed unduly the great body of work done by the commission on other angles of law enforcement, but he believed that results from this other and more valuable labor were in process of realization.

In the National league the Boston Braves narrowed the margin between themselves and the Cubs to two and a half games by nailing out the tail-end Pittsburgh Pirates 6 to 5 in 12 innings. French went the route for Pittsburgh but Boston used four hurriers.

tee went to work on the vital supply and economy bills, determined to bring about savings of more than \$200,000,000 which are necessary to make the new tax bill balance the 1933 budget.

House Committee to Meet
Over in the house, the economy committee, which had its committee bill shattered, was called to meet this afternoon on plans for other moves to cut government costs.

President Hoover worked steadily in a continued effort to rally support in the Republican-controlled senate jointly for the compromise tax bill and \$237,000,000 money-saving program.

Chairman McDuffie, in making the announcement of the house economy committee meeting, said: "We are going to try to effect some other economies, if at all possible. We will welcome suggestions from President Hoover or anyone else."

McDuffie said he hoped "that we might salvage a few millions more if we can get the co-operation of the executive department."

He hoped the senate would approve the section in the house economy bill

giving President Hoover broad authority to reorganize the government departments so some reductions in government costs could be made in 1933.

"President Hoover said if given the authority he could make many consolidations within 30 days that would effect economies," he said. "I am in favor of that, in addition, he could make many permanent economies that will help the taxpayers in years to come."

The riddled house economy bill authorized President Hoover to reorganize government activities not created by statute subject to congressional approval. McDuffie added he did not believe congress will veto any reorganization of the government that will effect savings, without impairing the efficiency of the federal structure."

President Hoover has been assured a move will be made to hold the senate in day and night sessions on the tax bill.

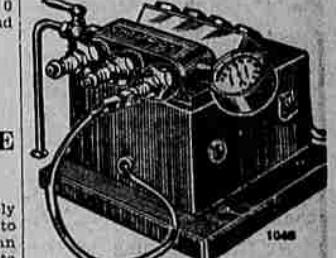
