

500 Lives Lost In State of Annam In Fierce Hurricane

EUROPEANS ARE INCLUDED AMONG THE FATALITIES

Hurricane Followed By Flood — In France, 38 Persons Buried Today Under Landslides.

HANOI, French Indo-China, May 9 (AP) — Five hundred lives were lost in a hurricane which swept from the China Sea across the southern end of the state of Annam last Wednesday, reports reaching here today said. Several Europeans were included in the death list.

The storm struck most furiously at the town of Phanhieth, 75 miles east of Saigon, capital of French Cochinchina, and Bangay, 30 miles farther along the coastal railway. Communications were wrecked and accurate information was difficult to obtain.

It was learned, however, that the towns of Cana and Dran were wiped out and that the European population of Cana was without shelter.

The hurricane was followed by flood.

38 BELIEVED BURIED
LYONS, France, May 9 (AP) — Thirty-eight persons were believed buried today under landslides which swallowed up two apartment houses in the outskirts of Lyons.

Twelve injured were removed before rescuers were ordered away by Edouard Herriot, the mayor and former premier, who himself escaped death from another slide only by leaping to safety.

The rescue parties returned to the ruins however, after cries were heard in the wreckage.

Explosions and fires preceded the slides. The first occurred at 9 a. m., while many of the residents were asleep. It cracked the gas mains. Firemen removed the first twelve persons before the second and larger slide tumbled down, crushing both buildings.

M. Herriot, whose party emerged victor in the national elections yesterday, leaped to the top of the ruins when firemen failed to obey his request to leave. Engineers had predicted a new collapse of the walls.

"Do you want to be killed?" he shouted. He himself jumped just in time to escape the crash.

About 100 persons were killed in a similar landslide on Fourviere Hill here in November 1930. The slide today was blamed on heavy rains and melting snow which undermined the subsoil in the hills.

Edith was always a frail child. Every childhood disease that cropped up in school could surely number her among its victims.

Mumps, measles, scarlet fever, middle ear infection, chicken pox, whooping cough — she had them all, as well as numerous attacks of grip which kept her in bed and out of school for weeks at a time.

Edith's parents helped her to look upon her illnesses as so much bad luck, something quite outside herself.

Nebraska Town Cuts Taxes, Has Treasury Surplus

TRENTON, Neb. (AP) — From this little Nebraska town comes a note of cheer in the midst of gloom over mounting taxes.

Trenton, let it be known, is slashing taxes right and left—and there's still a surplus in its treasury.

So far this year Trenton's not-quite 200 citizens have made these changes to lighten the tax load:

The village tax has been eliminated, light, heat and power rates have been cut, and village officials have reduced their own salaries and effected other economies to hold down expenses.

City Plant Pays Expenses
Revenue from the municipal light-water-and-ice plant is expected to pay all the town's expenses. The plant, valued at more than \$150,000, also supplies ice to several nearby towns.

In the last few months Trenton has paid \$5,000 on its bonded indebtedness and there's enough surplus in the treasury to pay all bonds yet due, except refunding bonds.

Rents Cut, Too
Abolishment of the village tax has been followed by reductions in rents which has been anything but displeasing to renters.

In spite of its economies, however, Trenton boasts one of the best street-lighting systems in any Nebraska town. It has 18 blocks of "white way," and its streets are kept in tip-top condition.

Both teams lost both ends of doubleheaders yesterday and went down in their sixth straight defeat.

The Missions were victims of Los Angeles, winner of yesterday's games by scores of 4-2 and 10-8. The Angels pounded Ted Pilleite for 12 hits in the first game, and three Mission pitchers failed to stop them in the second.

Oakland's grief was caused by Sacramento which won 8-0 and 3-2, the second game going a dozen innings.

In the last game the Oaks tied the score in the eighth inning when Steinbacher, Senator rightfielder, booted one.

The largest crowd this season at Los Angeles turned out to watch San Francisco and Hollywood split a doubleheader. Officials estimated nearly 10,000 fans were in the stands. The Stars took the opener 1-0 and the Seals came back to grab the second 3-2. Soviet's Air Fleet Launched by Test Of First Dirigible

LENINGRAD (AP) — Forerunner of a fleet of lighter-than-air craft, Soviet Russia's first dirigible built of domestic materials by native workmen made a successful trial flight here of 35 minutes.

The fleet is to be turned out under the supervision of General Umberto Nobile, Italian aeronaut, within three years.

Details of design and size were kept secret except for the announcement that the new ship has a gas capacity of 2,200 cubic meters and a "group" of 150 horsepower motors. It is christened the "UK-1."

The craft was constructed at the factory "Dirigiblestroy," where Nobile will take up his work this summer, assisted by picked Italian experts.

Laying of the framework of a second dirigible of similar design, the "UK-2," was begun immediately.
