Breaded Veal Chop
Creamed New Potatoes
Buttered Spinach

COFFEE
BREADED VEAL CHOPS
6 rib chops
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1 egg
1 tablespoon cold water
1 cup cracker crumbs or meal
5 tablespoons fat
Sprinkle chops with salt, paprika and celery salt. Dip in egg which has been mixed with water. Roll in crumbs. Heat fat in frying pan. Add and brown chops. Lower fire and cook over moderate fire 20 minutes. Have chops cut 2-3 inch thick.
CREAMED NEW POTATOES
8 medium sized new potatoes
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/3 teaspoon salt
2 cups milk
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
Scrape potatoes with sharp knife. Cook in boiling salted water until tender when tested with fork. Drain well. Melt butter and add dry ingredients. Add milk and cook until creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. Pour over hot potatoes which have been placed in serving dish. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.
CHOCOLATE NUT CAKE
1/2 cup fat
1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
1 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 1/2 squares chocolate, melted
1/2 cup nuts
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 2/3 cups flour
