## "Railroad Journey" To Far Corners Of Earth Feature of Dinner Held Last Night at La Grande Hotel

A "railroad journey" to the far corners of the earth closed the year's activities of the Young Women's Educational union, at a banquet last night at 8:45 at the La Grande hotel. The "Sleeping Car," a one-act play by William Dean Howells, was the main feature of the program, and the entire event carried out an appropriate motif.

About 60 women attended the banquet which was served at small tables in the main dining room at the hotel, each of which was decorated with a centerpiece of rose buds. At each place the menu card was printed on regular menus such as are used in dining cars, and the nut cups were miniature black suitcases covered with bright stickers from different parts of the world.

Mrs. F. S. Lyons was elected president for the coming year. Mrs. Glenn Wagner, vice president, and Mrs. Homer Leffel, secretary, following the report of the nominating committee. Mrs. H. E. Dixon and Mrs. Sherwood Williams, during the business meeting which preceded the program. Mrs. A. W. Burnett, outgoing president, presented a resume of the year's work, and Mrs. Lyons outlined her platform for the coming year. Next year's programs were announced by the chairman of the program committee, Mrs. C. E. Sting, and will begin on Sept. 13.

"The Sleeping Car," which was given in the ball room, was cleverly presented with the stage arranged to resemble the aisle of a pullman car. The talkative occupant of the car, Mrs. Roberts, who was rushing to her home in Boston to greet her brother whom she had not seen since childhood, was portrayed by Miss Eileen Morelock. Her aunt and traveling companion was Miss Beatrice Young. The brother, Willis, was played by Miss Mae Stearns; and the husband, Mr. Roberts, was portrayed by Mrs. Mary Heasler. The Californian, who was continually annoyed by Mrs. Roberts who mistook him for her baby and her brother, but who proved to be nobody at all, was played by Miss Bertha Wallinger. Voices from the berths of persons who complained because they were not allowed to sleep were Miss Mabel Doty and Miss Ma-

bel Morton. The blackface porter, an amusing role, was taken by Mrs. Isis Adler; while Miss Kathryn Moran, dressed in the conventional costume of the conductor, directed the activities of the train and attempted to keep peace among the occupants of the sleeping car.
