MODIFICATION OF COLUMBIA PROJECT VOTED

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)— The house rivers and harbors committee today tentatively adopted a \$7,000,000 modification in the Columbia river project calling for deepening from 24 feet to 32 feet of the 4 1/2-mile stretch from Vancouver, Wash., to the mouth of the Willamette river. Representative Johnson urged the project, explaining that the deeper draft boats coming up the 30-foot channel to Portland could not continue on to Vancouver. With deepening, Johnson prophesied, trade will increase and Vancouver and Portland will be mutually helping each other. The annual maintenance is estimated at \$35,000 or \$13,000 more than the present project.

(Continued from Page One) Immediately after the state rested Dan J. Maloney, of defense counsel, announced he would offer several motions for a directed verdict acquittal and asked for time in which to prepare them. Argument on the motions was expected to continue until noon today and the jury was excused until the afternoon session of court. The state's announcement it was about ready to rest came after Circuit Judge Robert Tucker had ruled out of irrelevant the testimony of Elwood Wiles who had told of an alleged deal whereby Wilson was to have given him a "cut" from the anticipated profits of the market transaction. The court held such an arrangement was a "money transaction person to themselves" and not material to the case on trial. The state's final request before resting was to have the jury visit the proposed market site. The court took the jury to view the site.
