Eastman, in lowering the world marks for the 440 and 880, has shown the speed to warrant the guess he could knock three or four seconds off the present 600-yard standard of 1:04, set in 1926 by the brilliant Englishman, Douglas Lowe.

Big Ben will, of course, have several good chances to crack the record for metric distances of 400 meters up, in the tryouts as well as the Olympics. Before he gets through he should post the greatest collection of world records credited to any athlete outside of Paavo Nurmi. The Finn now owns 11 official marks and has staked a good claim on three others, pending the scrutiny of the I. A. A. F. this summer at Los Angeles.

TIMES TO CUT FIELD

If the appeal for Olympic funds draws no faster or more substantial response than has been exhibited so far, the American teams may have to rely in many instances upon athletes who can dig into their own pockets for expense money.

Track and field will, of course, get the preference when disbursements are made. The minor sports will be the chief sufferers but the necessity for trimming, over and above the exercise of economy, will exist right down the line.

There will be no advantage to paying the cross-country expenses of athletes who can't shade 31 minutes for 10,000 meters, hit 35 feet in the broad or do close to 50 feet in the hop, step and jump.

Similarly, in such sports as fencing, weight-lifting, etc., only the American competitors with a real chance to do something against the strong foreign competition should be given the Olympic chance.

It is a good year, too, to trim the

courage which accompanied her arrival here yesterday.

Before the world's biggest airship was anchored last night, two men lost their lives, and a third was saved only by a display of iron nerve.

Beet by stormy weather in Texas on the transcontinental journey, the Akron arrived here yesterday at 9:07 a. m., to figure in its death dealing climax.

Break Air Condition Blamed

"Peculiarly stratified air" was blamed by Lieut. Commander C. E. Rosendahl, master of the Akron, for the big airship's sudden ascent after snapping its cable, as efforts were being made to moor it.

Two hundred blue jackets had hold of the lines dropped from the Akron and were swinging it into position when a "peculiar" current of air caused the big ship to swing upward. All but three of the sailors let go of the ropes as they felt themselves leaving the ground.

So sudden was the rise of the Akron, that the three men who clung to the ropes had reached a dangerous height before they realized their predicament, higher and higher the Akron swung. At a height of about 175 feet, one of the sailors tired. He lost his grip and fell to the earth. A few feet farther up, another of the trio gave out, and he, too, fell to the ground. Both were killed instantly. They were Robert H. Ebsall of South Bend, Ind., and Nigel Hutton of Fresno, Cal.

The third sailor, C. M. Cowart, 19, climbed up the rope until he reached a "tangle" — a cross bar of wood spliced between the rope. For more than two hours, he dangled beneath the dirigible as it maneuvered over the field, the ship at times reaching a height of 2500 feet. Slowly, calmly sitting on the tangle waited until

such time as members of the crew of the Akron could be spared to pull him through a hatch and into the airship.

No Trouble at First

Commander Rosendahl said the Akron had first approached the field without trouble.

"We came down nicely," he said, "but just as we neared the mast with the ground crew hanging on the ropes, we seemed to hit a cold air strata, and the Akron shot up."

The cold air strata caused the helium in the dirigible to contract, sending it upward with terrific force. The Akron was to depart today for Sunnyvale, near San Francisco. She later was to take part in naval maneuvers with the Pacific fleet, but the date for her joining the water ships was uncertain.

Appointment Up To The Governor

SALEM, May 12 (AP)—Appointment of a special prosecutor to conduct a grand jury investigation of the affairs of Judge L. H. McMahan's department of the Marion county circuit court, is a matter entirely within the discretion of the executive offices. Attorney General Van Winkle will advise Governor Meier, it was announced here late yesterday.

The grand jury investigation was requested by the Marion county court after Judge McMahan had released a statement in which he criticized sharply the conduct of certain state and county officers. McMahan said he based his statement on a report of a previous grand jury, which Judge Skiptworth of Lane county later held was illegally constituted.

"Maybe he can do all three and keep his peak but the odds would be against him," continued the veteran coach. "From the viewpoint of the Olympic schedule, his easiest program would be to run the 800 on the first three days and then have a three-day rest before tackling the relay. On the other hand, if he stays unbeatable at the 400, he might do better to concentrate on three or four days of fast work in succession, before losing any of the fine edge."

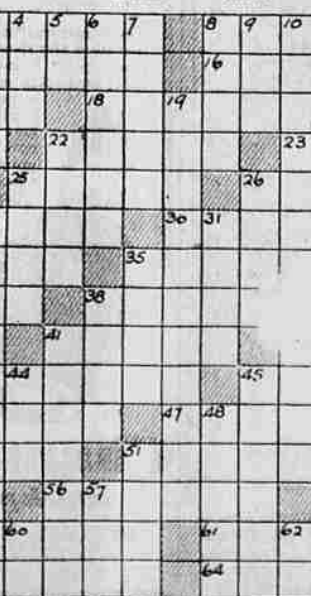
