The card displays at football games were introduced at the Naval academy during the 1930 season by Aldshipman N. C. Copeland, a member of the 1931 class.

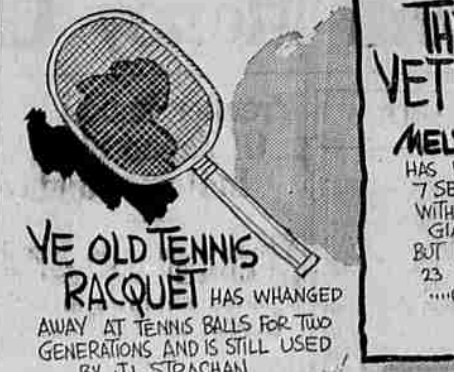
However, it was not Copeland's original idea. He received his information regarding these stunts from Stanford university, at Palo Alto, Calif.

## Swetonic Turns In Another Win In Big Leagues

Steve Swetonic, home-town boy who made good, is becoming the pitching sensation of the National League.

The crick right hander of the Pittsburgh Pirates pitched his third shutout of the season yesterday, halting the Brooklyn Dodgers with two hits for a 2-0 victory.

Previously he had blanked the Cardinals and the Cubs with three hits apiece. All told this season he has permitted only 14 hits in 36 innings and won three games and lost one.

Tony Cuccinello got both of Brooklyn's hits but his double in the fifth was a gift pure and simple. Floyd Vaughan, young Pirate shortstop, backed up for Tony's Taxes leaguer but still decided not to take it and it fell safely behind him.

Piet's single, steal of second and third and an infield out gave the Pirates one run in the fifth off Joe Shaute and the other came across in the sixth on Suhur's double and Vaughan's single.

Braves Gain on Cubs

The Boston Braves moved up to within one game of first place by walloping the St. Louis Cardinals 9-3 while the league leading Chicago Cubs were bowing to the Phillies, 9-6.

The Cardinals jinxed themselves in advance by raising the world championship flag. Neither Bruce Cunningham nor Paul Derringer, starting pitchers, lasted long but the Braves uncovered an effective relief hurler in young Bob Brown who blanked the Cards with two hits in the last five innings and fanned four.

The Phillies gave Lon Warneke his first defeat, pounding him for 12 hits including home runs by Klein, Hurst and Virgil Davis, a triple by Hurst, and doubles by Hurst, Mallon and Virgil Davis.

The Braves beat the Cincinnati Reds, 9-1.

In the American league, Charley Ruffing held the Cleveland Indians to four hits and struck out 12 men in a 5-0 victory that put the Yankees within a game and a half of the league leading Washington Senators.

The Senators were beaten by the St. Louis Browns as Walter Stewart allowed only four hits. Charley Geier's seventh home run marked a five-run fifth inning rally that gave the Detroit Tigers a 7-2 victory over the Philadelphia Athletics.

The Chicago White Sox pounded Wiley Moore for nine hits and eight runs in the first two innings to beat the Boston Red Sox easily, 9-2.

Toads Oddly Hatched

The eggs of the suramin toad, of Dutch Guiana, are picked up by the male, one by one, as soon as they are laid, and imbedded in the skin of the back of the female. Here they remain for 75 to 85 days, at the end of which time they are hatched and come forth from their mother's back not in the polygod stage but fully grown toads. From 50 to 70 young toads may be hatched in this way at one time.
