## PREMIER INUKAI OF JAPAN SLAIN IN HOME SUNDAY

West Point cadets in America, and five junior naval officers surrendered themselves to the military police. They were held incommunicado. Civilian police asked their custody but the request was refused.

An eye witness described the attack upon Premier Inukai as follows: Seven of the youths, wearing army cadets' uniforms, forced their way into the premier's residence on Nagata hill, in the heart of the city, at dusk yesterday, shooting down four policemen who attempted to bar their way.

The aged premier was calmly smoking a cigar and talking to a friend within the house. In spite of the shooting at the door, he ordered the youths admitted.

"I'll talk to them," he said, "and then they will understand."

Mrs. Ken Inukai, his daughter-in-law, urged him to flee to safety. "Father! father! let's run away!" she cried.

"There's no use running," the premier replied, as the youths burst into the room. They fired two shots, the bullets striking the premier in the right temple and the nose. He slumped to the floor.

## Asparagus Florida, Serving 6

- 30 spears asparagus
- 4 cups water
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 tablespoon chopped pimientos
- Mix salt and water. When boiling, add asparagus and boil gently 20 minutes. Drain carefully, so that asparagus will not break.
- Arrange on buttered toast on serving platter. Top with sauce. Melt butter, add flour and when blended add milk. Add seasonings and cook until thick creamy sauce forms. Stir constantly. The sauce can be made while asparagus is cooking so that they will be done at same time.

## Cocoonut Meringue Cake

- (A delicious dessert)
- 3 egg yolks
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 4 tablespoons milk
- 1 teaspoon lemon extract
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- Beat yolks. Add sugar and beat until creamy. Add rest of ingredients and beat 3 minutes. Pour into shallow pan fitted with waxed paper. Spread with meringue.
- Meringue
- 3 egg whites
- 1-8 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup cocoonut
- 1-3 cup shredded almonds
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar
- Beat whites and add 1/2 cup of sugar. Beat until creamy. Add cocoonut. Spread over cake mixture. Mix almonds, cinnamon and 2 tablespoons of confectioner's sugar. Sprinkle over egg whites. Bake 45 minutes in slow oven. When cool, use sharp knife which has been dipped in warm water and cut into squares. Remove with spatula and remove waxed paper. Serve plain or topped with whipped cream or fresh fruit.

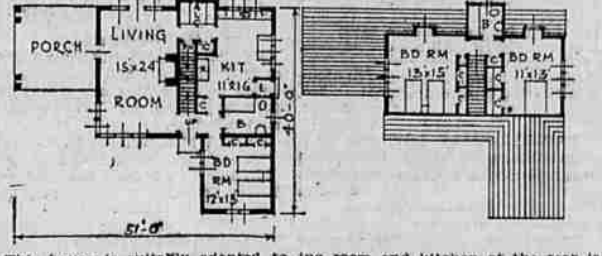
