Pierce Strong Here Former Governor Walter M. Pierce is expected to be given a big majority over Francis Galloway in Union county for the congressional nomination, and many Democrats are forecasting victory for Mr. Pierce in the primaries in the second district.

Most political observers believe that Democrats of this county will give Governor Roosevelt an overwhelming preference vote for the presidential nomination over Governor Murray, particularly in view of the latter's "running-out" of scheduled campaign speeches in Oregon a few weeks ago.
