## Salmon Loaf

Baked Potatoes  
Buttered Spinach  
Bread  
Butter  
Spring Onions  
Coffee

Salmon Loaf, Serving 6  
1 1/2 cups salmon.  
1 cup bread crumbs.  
2 eggs.  
1 cup milk.  
1-3 teaspoon salt.  
1/4 teaspoon paprika.  
2 tablespoons chopped celery.  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley.  
2 tablespoons butter, melted.  
Mix ingredients. Pour into buttered loaf pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold carefully and surround with sauce. Garnish with parsley.

Egg Sauce  
3 tablespoons butter.  
4 tablespoons flour.  
2 cups milk.  
1/4 teaspoon paprika.  
1/4 teaspoon celery salt.  
1/2 teaspoon salt.  
2 egg yolks, beaten.  
Melt butter and add flour. When blended, add milk and seasonings. Cook slowly and stir constantly until creamy sauce forms. Beat egg yolks with fork, and add several tablespoons of hot sauce. Mix well and pour into cooking sauce. Beat 1 minute and serve at once.

Rhubarb Turnovers  
2 cups flour.  
1/2 teaspoon salt.  
2-3 cup lard.  
2 tablespoons cold water.  
Mix flour, salt and lard. Mixing with knife, slowly add cold water. When stiff dough forms, divide it into 6 parts. Roll out each piece and add portion of rhubarb mixture. Fold edges of dough over corners, and moisten edges of the dough with cold water before folding. Pinch edges together. Prick tops with fork. Place 2 inches apart on baking sheet or pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven.

Rhubarb Filling  
3 cups sliced rhubarb.  
2 tablespoons flour.  
1 cup sugar.  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.  
3 tablespoons butter.  
1 tablespoon lemon juice.  
Mix ingredients quickly with fork. If mixture is allowed to stand long before placing on pieces of dough it will draw juice and be too thin to use.

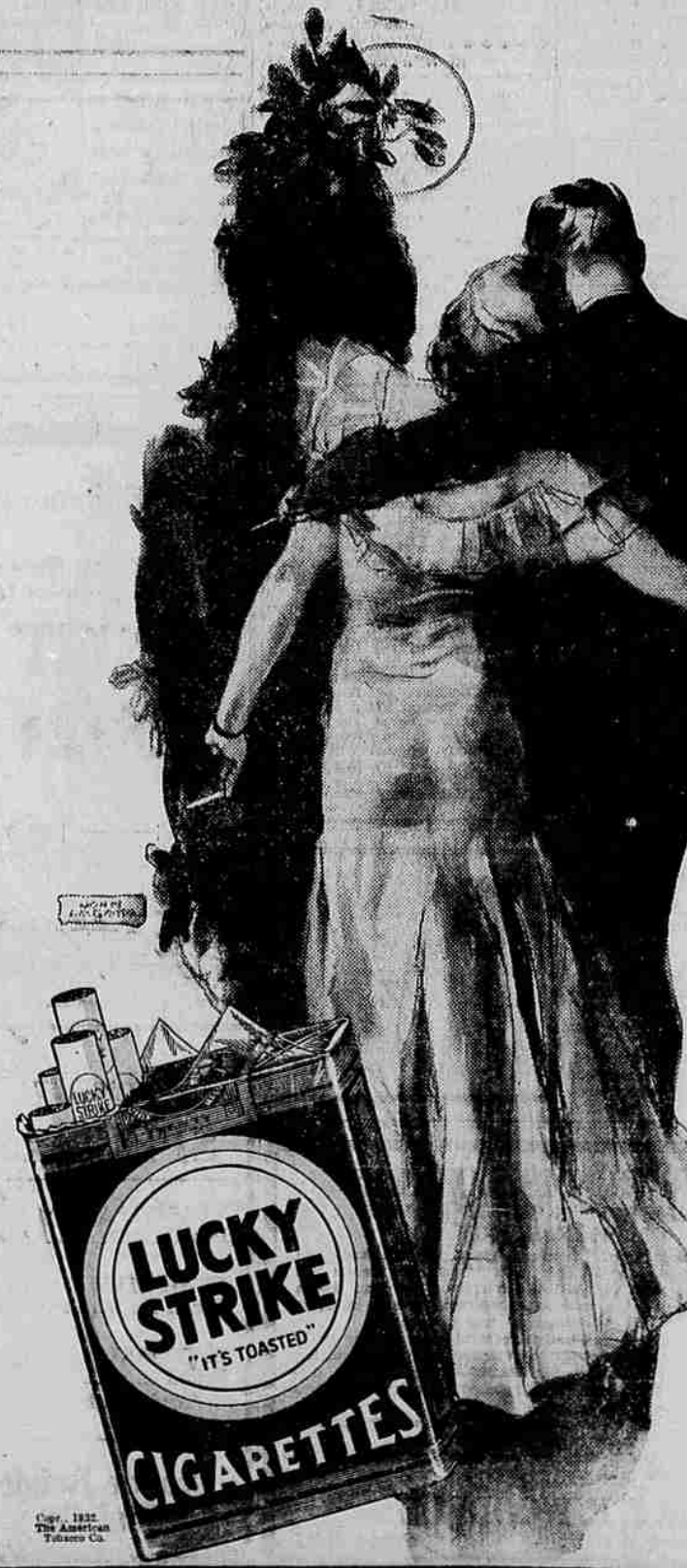
